



### Weed Control News

### FOXTAIL

This is an annual grass which creates a serious problem in gardens, cultivated crops and

The stems may be single, or several, and branching at the base. For a grass plant the leaves are quite large and may even be a half-inch wide narrowing down to a fine point at the tip. The seed head is a bristly spike two or three inches long, resembling a miniature tail of a

In recent years "foxtail" is tending to build up in the crop rotation. This is mainly due to the lack of competition from many broadleafed weeds which are being removed as a result of 2,4-D sprays. It however, is not readily controlled by the 2.4-D chemicals:

Foxtail is quite often a problem in the corn crop. The seeds germinate mainly between May 15 and June 15, so that early spring and late summer cultivation has little effect on control. Atrazine at the rate of 11: to 2 ibs. (active) in 20-30 gallons of water per agre as an early postemergence overall spray is recommended.

However, under dry conditions the atrazine may not penetrate down deeply enough into the soil to kill all germinating weeds. In this case shallow cultivations may be required. However, many farmers report that atrazine is quite effective in controlling foxtail.

In direct seedings of pure alf-alfa or Birdsfoot Treefoil, "Foxtail" can be controlled by a chemical called Dalapon. This

would require a spray of about 4 lbs of Dalapon per acre in 10-20 gals, of water. It should be applied when the legumes have 2 or 3 true leaves. It must be remembered that this can only be done on direct seedlings of the legumes. It forage grasses such as timothy, orchard or brome are seeded do not use
