Start \$400,000 motel and holiday complex near Mohawk Raceway

Construction will start within two weeks on a \$400,000 motel, holiday complex on a Nassagaweya site on Highway 401 and the Campbellville Road adjacent to Mohawk Raceway, it was announced this week. Completion is scheduled for late this

Mohawk Motor Inn, besides an initial 25 motel units, will include a dining room, coffee shop, cocktail lounge, banquet or meeting room and Sunoco service station.

The exterior of the motel will be colonial style with stone and wood construction. All the buildings including the service

station will preserve the architectural colonial style.

The complex is located on a 70 acre parcel of land, allowing for expansion. Principals of the project point out the concept of the development is of a high class motel in a conservation setting, establishing an ideal location for the development of a holiday centre. A heated swimming pool is scheduled for in-

stallation next spring. Besides the inside dining facilities it is intended to develop outside dining and barbecuing areas to complement the holiday atmosphere.

Heating, air conditioning and services will be all electric. Limited outside-areas may also be heated electrically.

The motel will be developed or a single level although initial plans had called for a twostorey plan of construction. Adequate land for expansion, however, precluded the need to go to a two storey plan.

The initial 25 units planned for the motel will determine the need to expand that part of the complex. If use indicates expansion would be warranted; an additional 25 units will be added after a trial period.

The coffee shop, dining room and cocktail lounge will each seat about 75. A banquet or meeting room will accommodate an estimated 50.

"We hope to develop a holiday centre away from it all and yet close to home. We want to preserve the rural setting" the developers told this newspaper.

Staff, estimated at 40 to 45, will be hired from this area. The site is about half an hour from either Toronto or Hamilton and is within 214 miles of three major conservation areas. the developers noted.
