Weed Control News

MILKWEED

Milkweed is a perennial that is easily identified at any stage of growth. The shiny leaves are opposite on the single stem growing two to five feet high. Inside the stern is a sticky milky substance from which the plant gets its name. The creamy or purple flowers form a cluster on top of the stem. One or more roughly shaped seed pods form per plant and the seed is equipped with an arrangement of hairs like a parachute and will float across the countryside in the fall.

This weed spreads by seeds and by shoots from an extensive underground system. Cutting prevents the setting of seeds and spreading to new locations. but will not prevent rapid spread from the root system in

an established area. Brushkill at 16 oz. of acid per Amitrol has been used.
