### Delegation to Halifax convention causes hassle at county council

Four members of the County Roads Committee, with the county engineer and retiring engineer were authorized to attend the Canadian Good Roads Convention in Halifax, over objections from several members of county council on Tuesday.

Burlington Deputy Reeve Frank Rogers, who will be travelling overseas later this year at county expense, led the objection, noting the roads committee had earlier attended the Ontario Good Roads convention.

Georgetown Deputy Reeve J. Young objected to sending retiring engineer Roy Smith to the convention.

Deputy-reeve A. Day of Oakville suggested the county should be cutting down on attendance at conventions. "This looks like a good place to start," he concluded. "If you go to the Ontario convention, the Canadian one should be cut out."

Reeve Gordon Gallagher of Burlington suggested the members were being piecemeal. He maintained attendance at conventions promoted good public relations for the county.

Milton Deputy Reeve C. Menely wondered why members should start picking on the Good Roads convention. "They should all be dealt with. It's not fair to single out one."

A complete list of county memberships in associations and the conferences should be compiled and reviewed at the beginning of a year, Reeve W. Coulter of Nassagaweya argued.

If the Good Roads convention is deleted, all conventions "including the overseas trip" should be cut, Deputy-reeve W. F. Hunter suggested.

"It's up to the council to decide a future policy, but I don't see the logic or right to interfere this year," Warden Hinton commented. He suggested the whole subject should be properly considered next year.

### TON OF GOLD COWS

Starcrest Bijou Betty, 327787, Excellent, a Jersey cow in the herd of A. Neilson Stark, Georgetown, has just been issued a Ton of Gold certificate. In 1425 days she produced 2,192 lbs. of fat. Betty is a daughter of the Superior Sire Brampton Sir Bijou Radar, 124107, and also a winner of two Silver Medals and a Gold Medal.

Avonlea Raleigh Suzanna, 291-961, Excellent, another Jersey cow in the herd of Featherstone Bros., Oakville, has just been awarded a Ton of Gold certificate. In 802 days she produced 2,047 lbs. of fat. She is also a winner of three Silver Medals, 10 Gold Medals, eight Medals of Merit and another Ton of Gold certificate.

To qualify for this award a cow must produce at least 2,000 lbs. of fat in four consecutive years.

### Weed Control News

**MILKWEED**  
Milkweed is a perennial that is easily identified at any stage of growth. The shiny leaves are opposite on the single stem growing two to five feet high. Inside the stem is a sticky milky substance from which the plant gets its name. The creamy or purple flowers form a cluster on top of the stem. One or more roughly shaped seed pods form per plant and the seed is equipped with an arrangement of hairs like a parachute and will float across the countryside in the fall.

This weed spreads by seeds and by shoots from an extensive underground system. Cutting prevents the setting of seeds and spreading to new locations, but will not prevent its rapid spread from the root system in an established area.

Brushkill at 16 oz. of acid per acre will kill the top growth if applied when the plants are about a foot high. A second spray when new growth appears will kill most of the root system. Spray directed at the underside of the leaf is much more effective than on the smooth, shiny upper surface. Brushkill will also kill clovers and alfalfa but it is often better to lose a few good plants than to let this weed become established.

Milkweed usually grows in patches and spot treatment will prevent unnecessary crop losses. If the plant is in a waste area, or fence bottom, a spray application of Amitrol or Amilrol T will kill all the vegetation in the sprayed area.

A short period of soil sterility may result. Do not allow stock to pasture for two weeks where Amitrol has been used.

### Wellington bus trip for soil, crop group

The executive of the Soil and Crop Improvement Association met in the Agricultural Office, Milton, on Thursday evening, June 16. Tentative plans were made for the annual bus trip to Wellington County on July 21. Farms will be visited to look over haylage, feeding systems, high moisture corn, manure handling systems, and sprays.

The suggested corn meeting is for September at the Corn Trials at Aubrey Livingston's farm, Brampton. These are the joint corn trials of the counties of Halton, Peel and York.

Work is progressing on the new homes in Lakeshore subdivision. Several extra building lots have also been sold and erection of houses will start soon.
