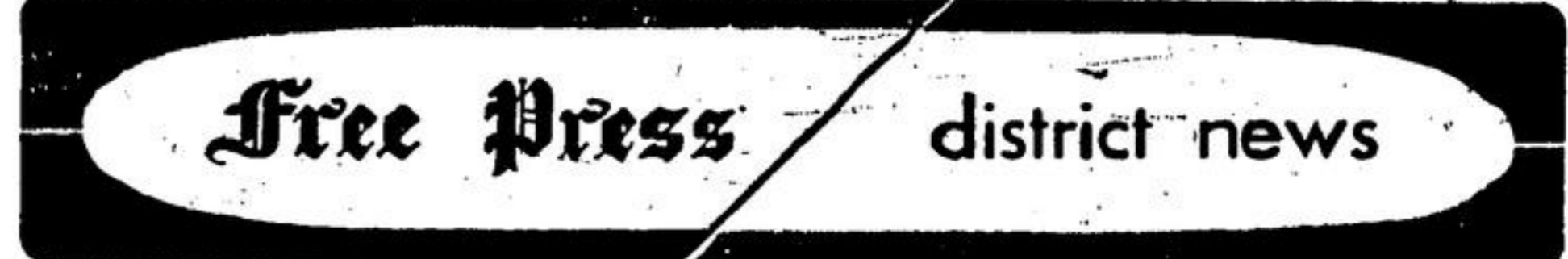

**Nassagaweya Council Briefs**

At their regular July meeting in the Township Council chambers on Monday night, Nassagaweya Township councillors:

• Approved a suggestion by Deputy-Reeve William Hoey to donate an old dictionary — believed to be at least 70 years old — to the Halton County Museum Board. The Noah Webster dictionary was purchased for 50 cents and has been used in the Township office for many years.

Mr. Hoey said it might be a valuable addition to the museum and councillors agreed. He believed it would be "a fine idea if every municipality in the County tried to donate some old article to the museum to mark Canada's Centennial year."

• Approved the purchase of a time switch to control the outdoor lights at the Administration building. Cost of the switch is to be somewhere between \$40-\$50.

• Learned the County Health Unit has employed four extra nurses and it is likely the township will receive extra services from now on.

• Approved the payment of \$200 for membership in the Central Ontario Regional Development Council. The membership fee was based on eight cents per capita, using the 1964 population figures.

• Received approval from the department of a supplementary road expenditure by law for \$17,500.

• Received a letter from Mrs. Mary Bilinski of R.R. 4, Acton,

requesting additional signs be erected on the road where she lives, requesting traffic to slow down. She said if signs are not put up soon, it might be too late, "some child could have his life taken away." The road committee and the road superintendent agreed to look into the problem and see if signs would be of any benefit. The Bilinski home is located near the west end of 17 Sideroad.

• Agreed to have the members of the road committee inspect two more graders. The township is considering purchasing a road grader and members of the committee have already inspected one grader. There were four tenders received.
