



Four attendants for bride at Phee-Johnson wedding

A Georgetown wedding on Saturday, May 14, of local and Acton interest, united in marriage Betty Sue Eileen Johnson, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Johnson, 14 Churchill Cres., Georgetown, and Arnold James Phee, son of Mrs. John McCallum, 129 Longfield Road, Acton and the late Mr. Lester Phee.

Standards of white and pink chrysanthemums were on the altar of St. George's Anglican Church, where Rev. John H. McMullin officiated at the double ring ceremony. Organist was Mr. George De Kleer, Georgetown, and a family friend and former Georgetown resident; Mrs. Gordon Padfield of Waterloo, was soloist, singing The Wedding Prayer before the ceremony and The Lord's Prayer during the signing of the register.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a white Chantilly lace over satin gown with a fitted bodice encrusted with iridescent sequins and seed pearls with a sweetheart neckline and fitted long-sleeved sleeves. A full skirt extended to five lace tiers at the back, forming a small chapel train. Her fingertip veil fell from a French pouffe design headpiece of cascading white flower petals and she carried a bridal bouquet of apple blossom pink roses, entwined with white lace and white satin ribbon.

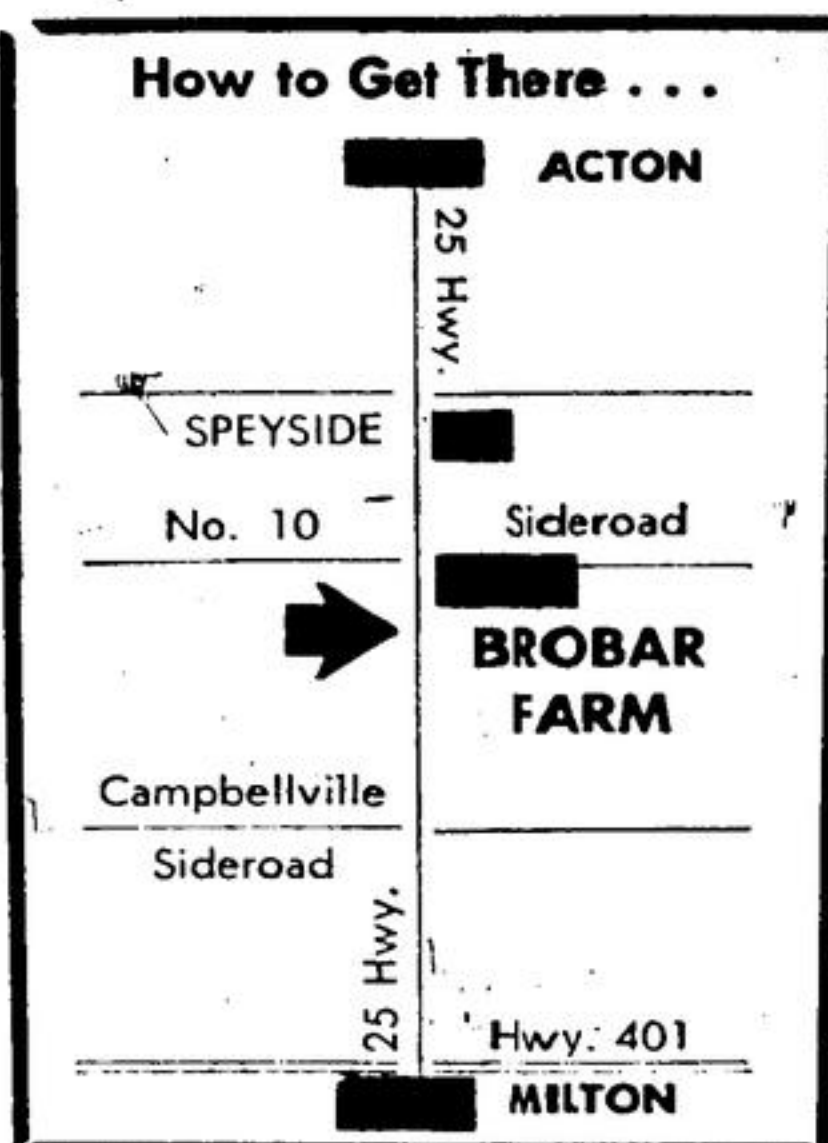

He was later taken to Guelph General hospital where he is still being treated. His car was a total wreck.

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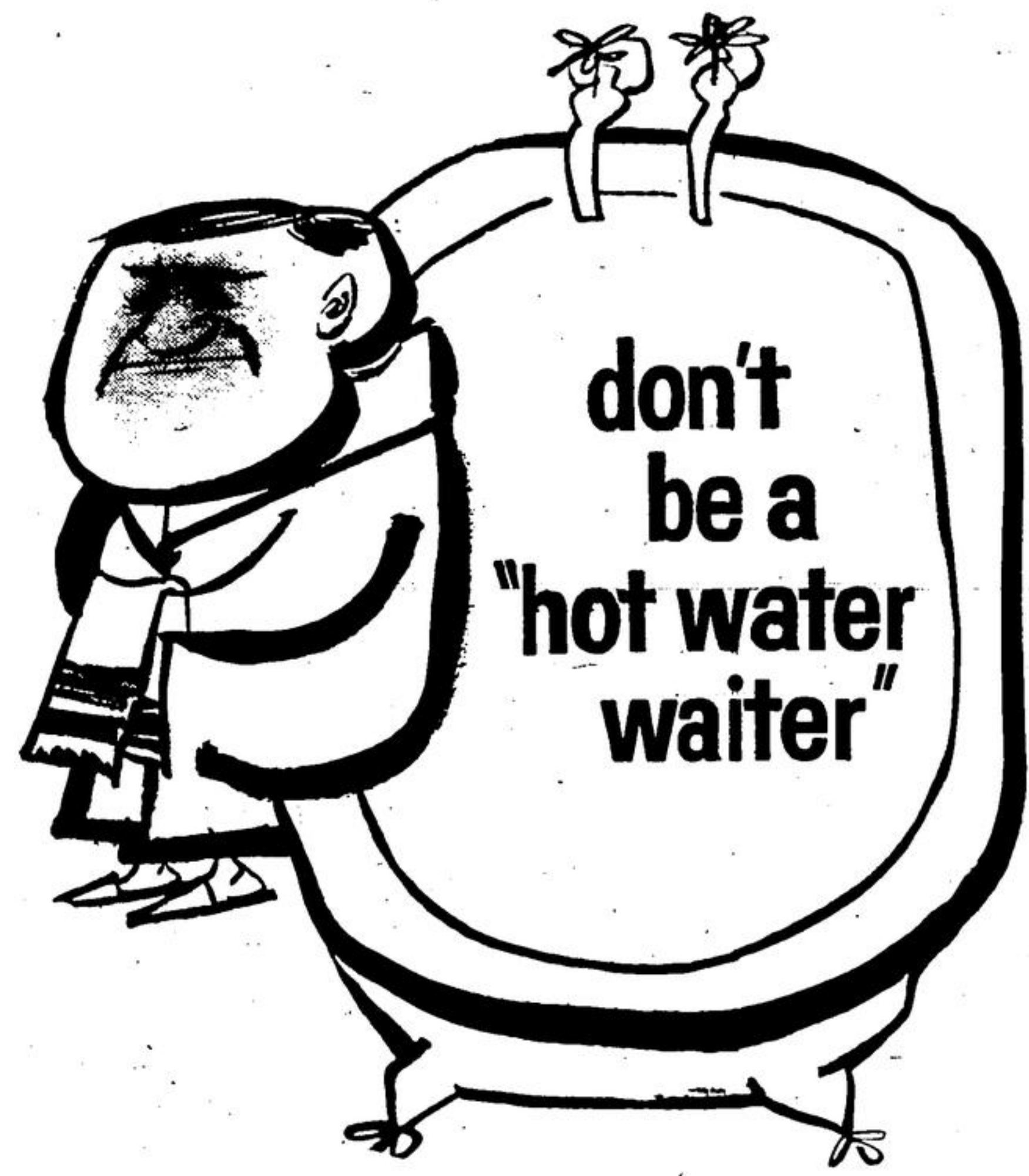
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
