Several delegations attend busy Eramosa council meet

Rockwood — Several persons were present, as well as all members of Council when the Eramosa Township Council met in the Council Chambers for their July meeting. The Reeve presided and those in attendance were the road superintendent, building inspector, Mr. Moon of the Wellington County Emergency Measures Committee, Messrs. Flewelling, Wheeler, Dudnick, Meadows, Mulder, Justin, J. Bonham and Clerk Hindley as well as the regular Council members. Mr. Moon gave a brief commentary on the Emergency Planning Guide for Municipalities which have been distributed among the various municipalities in Wellington County, and proposed a disaster exercise in Rockwood this fall. He extended an invitation to Council, officials and committees to inspect their depot in Guelph. The Reeve thanked Mr. Moon for his interesting report. Carl Meadows discussed with Council the problem of the Building Inspector requiring the erection of a beam in the basement of his house. His arguments were supported by Messrs. Justin and Bonham. After discussion with Council and the Building Inspector, a compromise was agreed upon. Mr. Dudnick asked Council to support a motion to the Department of Municipal Affairs on his behalf, requesting the Department to reconsider a decision that turned down approval of change in his lot. Since Mr. Dudnick had already sent a letter to the Department, Council decided that no action would be taken until Mr. Dudnick had received a reply. There was only one tender for the removal of the Speedside Hall. Council proceeded to accept the tender of Wheeler Bros. to remove the Speedside Hall and clean up the foundation for the value they will receive from the salvage of the building. Willard Flewelling reported to Council that he had destroyed five dogs and nine pups which had been harassing his cattle. Council passed to pay him \$60 for destroying the dogs and pups. There were nine items of correspondence dealt with and motions were passed where needed. Council discussed with the Building Inspector the feasibility of having one afternoon open for the purpose of people calling for building permits. After discussion, a motion was passed and was to be advertised in the Guelph Mercury. The Building Inspector, Elmer Kerr, will be available only on the Friday of each week, from 3 p.m. to 8 p.m. at his residence, for the issuing of building permits. The Building Inspector will be on vacation from August 1 to August 15 inclusive. The Road Superintendent, Reeve and Deputy Reeve were authorized to inquire about the possibility of having Fall Street from Highway 7 to the Park gate, and the Fourth Line of Nassagaweya and Eramosa Town Line to Highway 7 considered for development roads. It was moved that a by-law to authorize the construction of a new Township garage for the Corporation of the Township of Eramosa, at an estimated cost of \$25,000 be introduced, read a first, second and third time, passed and numbered 17-1966. This by-law is subject to the approval of the Department of Highways and the Ontario Municipal Board. One land severance was approved upon subject to the approval of the County Engineer, the Eramosa Building Inspector and the Wellington-Dufferin Health Unit. Four other land severances were approved by Council and will be recommended to the Minister of Municipal Affairs for approval. George Wallace was appointed as a member on the Board of Directors of the Grand River Conservation Authority representing Group 4, (Bill 32). The Council authorized the Ontario Hydro to install two additional street lights in the Village of Eden Mills, as requested by the Eden Mills Village Trustees. Grants were made by Council as follows: \$50 to the Eden Agricultural Society; \$50 to the Wellington County Fair Board, Fergus; \$35 to the Acton Agricultural Society, Acton, and the treasurer was authorized to include these amounts in the July 4, 1966 accounts. Council decided that the Reeve, Deputy Reeve and Wheeler Bros. proceed with the construction of a new cement slab for the front porch and the sidewalk. Accounts amounting to \$11,777.75 (road accounts, \$7,714.77; general, \$4,062.98) were passed for payment and the meeting adjourned to meet on Monday, August 8th, 1966 at 7:30 p.m. or at the call of the Reeve.
