113th anniversary of County Council

The date was July 12 but the year was different, Reeve George Leslie reminded members of Halton County. He noted it was on July 12, 1853 that Halton County Council held its first meeting in the present Milton Inn.

The council was meeting on July 12 again but the year was 1966, as they reviewed business in the air conditioned comfort of the council chambers in the new administration building Tuesday.

Reeve Leslie praised the previous County Councils for their foresight. "If our forefathers had not done so much, we would not be where we are today," he reminded councillors. Mr. Leslie said it was a privilege to take the chair for the committee-of-the-whole session Tuesday, on the 113th anniversary. He was Warden in 1953.

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
