the north as an Eskimo despite her long stay in the south. Intelligent, sensitive and beauty in the bargain, Mary was taught in mission schools at Pond Inlet where her father was a special R.C.M.P., con-

She came to Acton to school and shone in art, especially. From here, she went to Hamilton and then spent three summers as an interpreter for the federal health department aboard the Arctic supply ship "C.

D. Howe" In 1958, she began her distinguished career with the northern alfairs department.

One of her chief concerns is the preservation of the Eskimo language, which led her to found the magazine. She attributes her own success in school to the fact she was taught in her own language in the early

grades. "The Canadian government has provided everything for the education of Eskimos today except, of course, the Eskimo lang-

uage," she once wrote. Her experience as a school teacher's wife hasn't changed her strong views on the need to teach the Eskimo youngster in

his own tongue.

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
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
