If you do so you will receive your first payment in January, 1967 when Old Age Security becomes available to persons who have reached the age of 68.

IF YOU WERE BORN IN 1899

You should make application at least six months in advance of your 68th birthday.

PAYMENT IS NOT AUTOMATIC—YOU MUST APPLY

Obtain an Old Age Security application form at your local Post Office, or by writing to the Regional Director of Old Age Security in the central city of your province. The envelope containing the application form also contains an information pamphlet on Old Age Security which indicates the exact month in which persons born in 1899 should apply.

To keep insured follow the instructions on the Hospital Insurance Certificate of Payment 'Form 104' that your present employer is required to give you on leaving.
