Model planes compete in U.S.

Ron Malcolm, 139 Tides Ave., and Jim Jennings, Eden Mills, are among the more than 1,500 entrants in the National Model Airplane championships, who registered at Naval Air Station, Glenview, Ill. The meet, often called the "world series" of model aviation, runs from Monday, July 25 through July 31.

The U.S. Navy is acting as host to the meet for the 19th consecutive year. The last National Model Meet held at Naval Air Station, Glenview, Ill., was in 1962.

Contestants will fly their models in events ranging from free-flight gas to radio-control, control line speed, jet and team racing contests. In the Navy career events, modelers will fly their gas engine planes off and land aboard the deck of the miniature aircraft carrier, USS Small Fry.

Contestants signing first, second and third place in each event will be awarded a trophy while the Grand National Cham-

pion receives a perpetual challenge trophy.
