Close to 700 Ukrainian youths to enjoy camp facilities here

Before the summer is over, facilities at the Ukrainian Youth Camp, east of Acton, will be enjoyed by close to 700 campers from places as far away as Fort William, Kingston and Windsor.

The first three-week camp for youngsters ranging in age from 6 to 11 years of age, finished Sunday, July 25, and the second camp is now underway.

During the first camp period, 297 youngsters attended and enjoyed sports, swimming, arts and crafts, lessons, singing and a bus trip to Kelso Conservation Park.

The group now attending num-

bers 265 and ranges in age from 12 to 15 years of age. As well as sports and games, they plan a five or six mile hike to enjoy an outing at some local spot.

Following this, there will be a course for counsellors, which includes youths over 15 years of age.

Each year at the conclusion of the summer program, a closing ceremony is held which parents of the children and Ukrainians from all over Ontario and parts of the United States attend. Normally some members of both federal and provincial parliaments attend, as well as high-ranking officials of the Canadian Ukrainian movement and town-council representatives.

The organization which owns the camp is non-communist. Any proceeds from the camp are used for camp improvements. Since last summer, the kitchen facilities, found to be inadequate to handle the large crowds, have been increased. The swimming pool was renovated last year and re-cemented.

All courses are attended by both boys and girls with a camp chief in charge and numerous qualified counsellors assisting.

The closing program this year is planned for Sunday, September 4 and many from Acton and district are expected to attend, as in the past.
