A few children continued to holler and shout and run-beyond the fences of Wallace Park, but those standing were silent. They were at a baseball game - the annual Halton County All-Star game - and they didn't stir because they were paying their respects to the memory of Pete McMullen.

Saturday night Pete died at Milton District Hospital and his death marked the end of an era in the annals of the Halton County Baseball Association. One reporter remarked on Sunday, "if it hadn't been for him, baseball in the county would have died a long time ago." That may or may not be true, but certainly, without Pete McMullen, baseball in the county would have been far worse off.

Pete was always a sportsman and when he accepted a position, he worked? Many collect titles, hang them on a hat rack

and then kit back and accept praise while others do the work. But not Pete. He'd tell you it was difficult looking after the Halton league, and it was - he knew, because he did it.

His life in sports was centred around his love for baseball. He once told us, "I've worked hard for baseball, but I'm sure I received more enjoyment out of the game than most people could ever dream of". He was an inveterate ball buff. Whether it was an Intermediate or Senior game or just a bunch of kids barting a ball around, he loved to watch. Armed with a lawn chair, he'd watch baseball every night of the week, if possible, and if you talked with him he'd probably tell you "I think I've seen more baseball than practically anyone in the county
