Herb's and Station Hotel in league finals

Herb's Delivery, newest entry in the town softball league, defeated perennial finalist Legionnaires 13-8 Tuesday night to catch a berth in the league finals against waiting Station Hotel.

Behind 3-0 until the sixth inning the delivery crew gave their supporters theitters until they came through with four big final innings to take the final game of the best-of-three series.

Legionnaires tied the series up on Sunday with an 11-9 win and in the early innings looked like they might win the whole thing.

Herb's big guns opened up in the sixth after a loaded bases

scoring attempt was squelched in the fifth by a perfect egg to the plate from Legion centre-fielder Wayne Marshall. His throw caught Fred Archibald racing home preserving a 30 Legion lead.

Key play in the game came in the top of the sixth when Herb's loaded the bases again on a pair of errors and a walk. Legion manager Gord James switched pitcher Chick Milne to second and brought in Ken Maltby in relief.

Manager Herb Dodds countered by bringing in Will Duval to pinch hit. The big redhead

grounded out to first but in his hurry to relay the throw home to nab the runners, first baseman Don Price threw high and two runners scored. Howie Leader singled to score the third man and the score was tied.

Herb's never looked back from that point. They added three more runs in the seventh and Hutch Richmond and Howard Pearce homered in the eighth for four more. They scored three more in the ninth on the dazed Legionnaires who seemed to choke up-ance they were behind.

Danny Arbie put some life into their attack in the eighth with a

two run homer and they collected three more in the ninth but efforts to revive flagging spirits were too little and too late.

Danny Arbie was the only Legionnaire to collect more than one hit. He slammed three, including a two run homer. John Leatherland, Ken Duncan, Ken Maltby, Don Price, Fred Thompson and Chick Milne hammered one each.

Legionnaires even up softball semi-final

Legionnaires evened up their town league softball semi-final series with Herb's Delivery Sunday afternoon by subduing them 11-9 in a slugfest which saw four pitchers parade to the mound and 26 hits almost evenly divided between the contestants.

The winners outslugged the losers 14-12 spacing 12 hits evenly among four frames, three of which netted 10 of their runs. Herb's had only seven bingles up until the last of the fourth when they staged a five-hit, four-run assault on the young veterans before they were doused.

Ken Maltby spun the winner Chick Milne in the ninth. Fred Archibald tossed the first five frames for the delivery crew with Howie Leader finishing up. Archie was tagged with the loss. He won the series opener 9-4.

Ahead 7-5 as they went into the ninth, Legionnaires looked to have the game almost gift wrapped when they scored four additional runs in the ninth for an 11-5 margin. Herb's matched them in the run department, however, in their half to keep the score close.

Herb's took a 2-1 lead in the second inning when Legion went scoreless in the opener in spite of three successive hits and scored one in the second as Wayne Marshall doubled and scored on two long fly balls. Howard Pearce landed safely as the third baseman bubbled to start Herb's off and Gary Taillefer unloaded a two-run homer.

The delivery crew made it 3-1 in the third as Butch Richmond singled, Johnny Goy's drive to third was hobbled and Howard Pearce sacrificed.

Legionnaires bounced back in the fourth with three runs on as many hits and duplicated that in the fifth for a 7-3 lead.

Phil McCristall, Butch Richmond singled, Will Duval doubled and Howard Pearce singled to chalk up four runs.

Centre fielder, Wayne Marshall was the leading slugger for the winners with three hits. Barrie Elliott, Don Price, Al Hayward and Chick Milne collected two-knock apiece.

Howie Leader was the leader for Herb's with three bingles. Butch Richmond and Don Archibald had two apiece with Gary Taillefer poking the game's lone homer.
