Archbishop will visit diocese

The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Reverend Arthur Michael Ramsey, is to visit Niagara Diocese (in which St. Alban's parish, Acton, is located) on September 10 and 11.

On Saturday morning the 10th, he will celebrate the Holy Eucharist at Christ Church, Niagara Falls, one of the oldest churches in the Niagara area. At 5:30 p.m. the same day, he will hold a press, radio and television-conference in the Sheraton Brock hotel, Niagara Falls.

At 6:30 p.m., he will dine with the clergy of the Diocese. On Sunday morning, the Archbishop will celebrate in St. Columba's Church, St. Catharines, at 8 a.m. At 11 a.m., he will preach at the Cathedral, Christ's Church, in Hamilton.

Unfortunately for Acton Anglicans, who will be attending their parish picnic in any case, even the Cathedral service on Sunday will be out of the question because of the press of numbers.

Following the Cathedral service, His Grace will sign the visitors' book at the City Hall, have lunch and a brief rest, and will then be taken to Milton to catch a plane for his next stopping point.
