### Ukrainian Camp closing depicts popular writer

The life of popular poet and writer Avai Franko was commemorated Sunday afternoon when over 5,000 attended the 20th anniversary of the Ukrainian Youth movement in Canada at the camp east of Acton.

In spite of earlier rains, the crowds kept arriving at the camp throughout the day to watch the closing exercises and hear guest speakers. Over 1,000 boys and girls who had completed their summer camping entertained with gymnastics and depicted the growth of the movement from the beginning in 1946 to the present day during a program in the evening.

Camp commandant Theo Woloshyn welcomed the many guests and introduced Dr. M. Huta, head of the Ukrainian Youth Movement in Canada. Dr. Huta explained the purpose of the Youth Movement and took the salute in the march past. Former Toronto Alderman and Member of the Provincial Parliament was guest of honor and during his speech commended the Youth Movement. T. Buyniak, head of the movement for Ontario was also on hand.

Each year the camp opens for the various age groups and the campers enjoy swimming, gymnastics and hikes as well as arts and crafts during their stay. The campers have become quite familiar to Acton residents as they are in town occasionally throughout their camping period.

Guests were present from Acton, various parts of Ontario and northern United States.

### Car out of control driver suffers cuts

A Port Credit man, Norman Grace, who is employed at the H.K. Porter plant in Acton, was hospitalized Thursday of last week with cuts to his head following a simple car crash east of town.

Mr. Grace told Dr. D. A. Garrett he reached to wind up the passenger's window when he lost control of his vehicle. The car travelled along the shoulder of the road, into the ditch, over a laneway at the McE McCullough farm and continued on an angle with two wheels in the ditch until it stopped at a highway sign.

The car stopped just 10 feet short of two boys walking along the side of the road. They didn't know which way to jump, they said afterward.

Constable Bruce Kressler of the Acton O.P.P. detachment rained for a Guelph ambulance and directed traffic until the arrival of Constable A. Colisnat of the Milton O.P.P. detachment who took over the investigation.

Mr. Grace was taken to Guelph General Hospital where he was treated for head cuts. He was travelling alone. His head struck the windshield but he was not thrown out of the car.

Owner of Acton Box Company, Gordon Ralston helped Dr. Garrett stem the flow of blood until the arrival of the ambulance.

Milton O.P.P. report the car received \$150 damage.

Mr. Grace has been released from hospital.
