**First of family, two arrive from Calcutta**

Both Mr. and Mrs. Kirley Chen work now in the Indian immigration office in Calcutta. They have also worked as translators and announcers in the broadcasting house during the war. They are willing to accept jobs in any capacity here.

**Mr. and Mrs. Chen** themselves have evacuated from China, Hong Kong, Singapore, Penang, Rangoon and Upper Burma during the Sino-Japanese and Pacific wars. They have lived nearly two and a half decades in India and regarded it as a "second homeland". Mr. Chen explained in a letter.

"During the past three years quite a few Chinese residents have left India after the Chinese Communists started creating trouble at the border. In the past there were about 1500 Chinese in Calcutta. They lived happily and carried out their vocation with the people of different communities. But now they are placed in a rather difficult position because of the Sino-Indian border dispute.

"Of late, the Chinese Communist government put our people in a very awkward position by sending an ultimatum to India. The Chinese Communists have created all sorts of trouble everywhere without rhyme or reason."

While a "sponsor" for the family is required, there is no legal obligation connected with the requirement.
