news to council, whose last word had been that the town would have to provide the lights themselves.)

Engineering has been done for reconstruction on highways 7 and 25 he said, and construction can be expected "in the not too distant future."

While the approximate dates are known, he pointed out that they must be approved by the Legislature before work begins. Prouse chairs jail committee

Brampton Mayor Russell Prouse has been elected chairman of the special five-man committee of Halton and Peel councillors who are overseeing construction of the new regional jail the two counties will share.

Indications of the first meeting were that the jail would be constructed in the eastern portion of Halton County, although a definite site has yet to be chosen.

Three Peel councillors, Reeve Gordon Gallagher of Burlington and Reeve William Coulter of Nassagaweya are on the jail committee. They met a week ago to lay plans for the regional detention centre which is expected to cost over \$2,000,000. The provincial government is assisting with construction cost. It will feature both maximum and minimum security sections and is described as "a whole new concept in penal reform institutions."

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Baha'is favor teaching of religion in schools

Only a handful of people attended a public meeting sponsored by the Canadian Baha'i association in the community centre Monday evening to hear Catherine McMillan of Burlington speak on religion in the public schools.

Results of a recent survey in Acton by members of the Baha'i world faith of Etobicoke showed 94 per cent of those questioned felt that some kind of religion should be taught in the school, 91 per cent believed some knowledge of other beliefs should be included in the course, 70 per cent believed all major religions should be taught, including Christianity.

Sixty-six per cent of those questioned felt religion should be stressed more in the home, 45 per cent believed it should have more importance in the school curriculum and 54 per cent believed the Sunday schools were doing a good job.

Miss McMillan, a Burlington teacher, and a Baha'i member, spoke to the group emphasizing that if religion was taken off the school curriculum it would be very difficult to get it back on again. Observances of such festivals as Christmas and Easter would be forbidden. Few people realized this, she said.

The speaker felt schools must teach religion not as at present but to show its influence on the course of history. She stressed the history of religion from the time of Abraham, picking out incidents to show when spiritual virtues perished, mankind took steps backward. When they flourished, mankind did also, advancing with each new manifestation of God's truth. Miss McMillan advocated a

wider course of study in the schools, one which would embrace all religions of the world. Baha'is believe the voice of God is heard in every religion and everyone would benefit from a knowledge of Buddhism, Hinduism, Jainism and other major religions, he felt.

A short question period followed.
