Grateful town gave gold watch still ticking 50 years later

With a watch which has been ticking for 50 years in his pocket, Acton's senior NCO in 1914 came back to Acton Fair on the weekend. The gold engraved watch, presented him by an appreciative town of Acton when he was invalidated home in 1916, will be 50 years old this October.
Harry Scott Harwood, who is now 85 years old, was spry, keenly interested and full of memories. He walked all over town renewing acquaintances.
When World War I broke out he was one of the first to enlist in Acton in August, 1914. He left with the first contingent. After he was twice wounded severely in the memorable engagement at St. Julien in April, 1915, he was invalided back to Canada.
There was excitement and pride in Acton when he returned; a parade accompanied him to the town hall where he was given the watch by H. P. Moore and other dignitaries. There were speeches and a program.
In the Free Press office last Friday, Sgt. Harwood looked through the newspaper files and read the account of the day he remembers so well.
After the war he worked at the tannery and was caretaker for the school and St. Alban's church. In 1918 at St. Alban's church he was married to Lizzie Prevost of Acton.
He recalls that the Legion started in 1915 with the "great war vets" was in the building which is now the funeral home. He moved from Acton in 1926 to go to Windsor where he worked for the Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg railway company. He retired 12 years ago.
He had a long list of former friends he wanted to see, among them Fred Coles, who was a fellow scout leader. While some of his former friends have died, he was pleased to meet their children or grandchildren.
Ninety years of age on Sunday, Mrs. Mabel Symon has lived in Acton for the past 20 years with her niece, Mrs. Marguerite Taylor.
Mabel Ross was born at Nottaw. She married the late Alex Symon and after living here for some years the couple went out west.
Tuesday afternoon members of the afternoon unit of the U.C.W. held a birthday party for her.
She is interested in television and has been attending church when able. Her health is not as good just now, but she maintains her interest in family and friends.

THE SCHOOL BOARD HAS APPROVED THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTIONS GOVERNING CLASSES TO BE OFFERED AT THE NIGHT SCHOOL
(a) All courses offered must have at least fifteen starting enrolment.
(b) In any course offering Part 1 of a Part 2 course for the year 1965-66, Part 2, of the course will be offered for the year 1966-67 regardless of total enrolment, subject to approval of the Board where very few applications are made.
(c) Where Part 1 and Part 2 are offered in the future the Part 2 course will be offered in the next year only if the course registration meets the registration number stipulated in Part (a) of this resolution.
(d) The A.V.C. Committee recommends to Georgetown District High School Board that no refunds be made on fees paid for Night School Course after first night of Course.
The Vocational Courses are all credit courses at the Grade 10, 11 level for the Secondary School Graduation Diploma.
Registration forms to be completed at the High School. Fees to be paid in cash (no cheques) on registration nights. All courses will start the week of October 5th. All special courses will be completed the week of December 7th. Vocational courses will be suspended for the Christmas season the week of December 7th and will return for the balance of the course the week of January 4th, 1967.
No class will be given unless there is a reasonable number of registrations. Fees paid on registration night for classes not being held will be refunded by the School Board Office. Individuals registering for a course not being given, will be notified, where possible, by telephone before the first class.
Requests for any class NOT included in the above will be given consideration. Further information regarding Night School classes may be obtained by telephoning 877-6966 between 8.30 and 4.30 weekdays.
