Car rams Esquesing bridge four receive injuries Sunday

Four people were hurt, two of them girls from Limehouse, when a car hit a bridge on the Sixth Line north of 17 Sideroad, Esquesing on Sunday afternoon.

Police said Anna Piarecka of R.R. 1, Limehouse, received the most serious injuries. A back seat passenger, she flew into the front seat and crashed her head against the rear-view mirror when the car struck the bridge, and 15 stitches were required to close the cut in her forehead. The other two passengers, her sister Wanda of the same address and Andrew Peter Wisniewski of Willowdale, and driver Donat Frej of Toronto, were all treated for minor cuts and bruises.

About five years ago, a girl was killed in a similar accident at the same bridge. Police said the bridge is just 15 feet wide at this point, and the approach to the bridge is on a curve in the roadway. The Frej car, a 1962 vehicle, was classed as a total wreck.

In other district accidents in the past week, cars driven by Jack Mellor of 92 Wallace St., Acton, and Vivian Susan Perry of Guelph received \$275 total damage when they collided on Highway 7 north of 22 Sideroad on Wednesday.

A car driven by Carole Roberta Shepherd of R.R. 2, Rockwood, received \$350 damage when it left the road and struck a fence Thursday on the Ching-tacous - Esquesing Town Line. There were no injuries reported in either accident.
