

Eramosa hires John Hewitt township building inspector

Rockwood — In the absence of Reeve Lush, Deputy Reeve Fred Cox presided for the October meeting of Eramosa Township Council. Several items of correspondence were read and dealt with as moved.

Following the interview of six applicants for the position of building inspector, the council passed the following resolution: to engage John Hewitt of R.R. 1, Rockwood, as building inspector for the Township of Eramosa. His duties will begin October 4, 1966, and his remuneration will be \$2.50 per hour plus 10c per mile and \$1.00 per permit.

The council agreed to one land severance in the village of Eden Mills. The Minister of Highways will be requested to designate Fall St. in the village of Rockwood from No. 7 Highway to the Conservation Park entrance as a Development Road.

It was moved and carried that the assessment roll made in 1966 for 1967 taxation be accepted as presented.

The clerk was instructed to request the Ontario Municipal Board for approval to pay \$6,500 in 1967, \$5,000 in 1968 and \$5,000 in 1969. This request is required because the lowest tender for the proposed garage is \$10,000 more than estimated.

Accounts amounting to the sum of \$9,759.85 (road \$7,641.45 and general \$2,118.40) were passed for payment. Council adjourned to meet as a Court of Revision and for general business on November 7 at 1 p.m. or at the call of the Reeve.
