The first 14 daughters of this bull to complete records have an average production of 10,234 lbs. milk, 481 lbs. fat, 4.70 per cent and 16 classified daughters average 8500 per cent.

Brampton Sileus Dreamer is a son of Brampton Graceland Dreamer, Excellent, Gold and Silver Medal, Senior Superior Sire. His dam is Brampton Lady Basila Radar, Excellent, a Ton of Gold cow, with a Gold Medal record at 7 years of age, when she produced 12,832 lbs. milk, 645 lbs. fat, 5.03 percent in 305 days. She is a daughter of Brampton Radar, excellent, a Medal of Merit, Gold and Silver Medal, Century Superior Sire.

Six Halton members to enter calves in '67 Queen's Guineas

Six Halton 4-H Calf Club members will be entering their calves in the Queen's Guineas competition held annually at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair, on Friday, November 18. To qualify, each steer must gain 2 lbs. per day during the five month period, from the first weighing on May 7 to the final weighing on October 5. The following members qualify for this Competition:

Doug Gardhouse, Milton R.R. 5, initial weight 404 lbs., final weight 712 lbs., average daily gain 2.04 lbs.; Edward Martin, Milton R.R. 1, I.W. 555 lbs., F.W. 857 lbs., A.D.G. 2.00 lbs.; Vera Thompson, Milton R.R. 2, I.W. 452 lbs., F.W. 757 lbs., A.D.G. 2.02 lbs.

The following Acton 4H Calf Club members received their final weighing on October 7, and therefore had to gain four pounds more than those listed above;

the proceeds of which were to Bill Jackson, Mono Road R.R. 1, I.W. 510 lbs., F.W. 880 lbs., A.D.G. 2.45 lbs.; Bob Lasby, Rockwood R.R. 2, I.W. 575 lbs., F.W. 925 lbs., A.D.G. 2.29 lbs.; Bill Lasby, Rockwood R.R. 2, I.W. 490 lbs., F.W. 835 lbs., A.D.G. 2.26 lbs.

Exhibitors to qualify must secure within their own club, at least 750 of the total 1,000 points allotted in the Calf Club project, with the score of the calf excluded.

Nearly a century ago the late King Edward VII, then Prince of Wales, created a fund for the development of agriculture in Ontario and placed it in trust with the Agricultural and Arts Society of Ontario. Kennedy Memorial Trophy, will be awarded to the exhibitor of the Champion Baby Beef Steer, which must be owned and exhibited by a qualified member of the 4-H Clubs of Ontario. The exhibitor of the Champion steer in each of the other breeds in this class will be awarded a cash prize of \$100.

NON-SKID STOP

Good drivers "pump" their brakes when the need arises for fast deceleration; that is, they apply, then release their brakes repeatedly in rapid succession. This reduces the danger of skidding and is recommended particularly when the road surface is slippery. But there is one potential danger in this technique that is little realized: If one of the brake lights is not functioning, pumping-gives the effect of a turn signal to the other brake light, which could mislead following traffic. This is an additional reason why all car lights should be checked frequently and replaced immediately when necessary.

High School Sports

The physical education department at Acton D.H.S. is extremely busy these days. The physical education program under department head Ron McCullum and physical education teachers Elizabeth Atkey and Bruce Andrews is already at full speed with interschool and intermural sports.

The department's program involves teaching skills in over 14 different sports to boys and girls. They include lacrosse, speedball, wrestling, gymnastics and badminton.

Next month, basketball begins. Both teams have a good nucleus coming back and coaches Ross Sullivan and Ron McCullum are expecting a winning season.

A newly-formed cheerleading group and a \$800.00 timer will make the year more enjoyable and interesting.

Acton high will also have a badminton team, coached by Mr. Curtis. It is hoped that the team will compete in CWOSSA. Mr. Andrews plans to have a year-round program for track

(Continued from Page One) in the community centre, and installing a "people heater" for use of the penalty timekeeper, scorekeeper and announcer.

2. Installation of a two way telephone connection between the penalty box and the office.

3. Purchase and installation of insulation for the back wall in the new storage building.

A discussion started by building chairman Townsley over who was responsible for painting lines on the ice for curling and hockey brought out several opinions before members agreed

to Mr. Townsley's suggestion that the arena staff should do it. "Painting of lines should be done by those operating the arena," said Mr. Townsley. "They're paying for facilities — they should be provided and it's our job to supply them."

"It's important lines be done properly," said Helen Otterbein. "Things like this that make it necessary for us to hire extra help around here," said Mr. Patterson. Both objections were mollified by Mr. Townsley's assurance the lines would be done right and quickly by the arena staff.

Chairman Len Lovell terminated the discussion by advising the building chairman to have the staff paint the lines but not to turn down any volunteers who show up to help. Previous years the lines were painted on by volunteers from curling and hockey clubs.

A request from Mr. Townsley that some space be set aside for a first aid room was set aside until the fair board was contacted to see if the large room downstairs could be used.

Members agreed with Mr. Townsley's suggestion that recreation director Howard Pearce draw up some arena rules to curb malicious damage. The building chairman suggested the rules be posted for all to see and violators barred from the arena for a set period of time.

Advised by an electrician the present transformer was inadequate for any further expansion the building chairman was to contact hydro officials to see if a larger one could be installed.

Recreation director Howard Pearce, back from his honeymoon, thanked members for their wedding gift and told them the program was going well.

A cheque was received from the Acton branch of the Legion earmarked for the trophy case, presently being constructed.

Financial statement number eight totalling \$236.86 was passed for payment.

Top price of the sale, \$4,500 was paid by Roger Applegate, Oakland, Iowa, for Aberfeldy Hostage, bred by R. W. Gardhouse. Second high price of the sale, \$3,500, was reached twice for two bulls consigned by S. G. Bennett, with Scotsdale Westgate going to the bid of Johnson Bros., Atlantic, Iowa and Scotsdale Waterloo to A. R. Cross, Rothney Farms, Midnapore, Alta.

\$3,200 was the price paid for Scotsdale Wrangler (also bred by S. G. Bennett) by Bill Weevil Farms, Waynesboro, Ga., and Acadia Farms, Northfield, Ohio. Again this price was reached twice for two bulls consigned by W. Steiger & Sons, Delavan, Ill., and Shea & Sons, Metamora, Ill., purchased Aberfeldy Habitant, from R. W. Gardhouse. This bull was Grand Champion at the recent C.N.E.

Female top of the sale was \$2,000, and this figure was reached twice, once by Bennett and once by Gardhouse, with Scotsdale Vanity Clipper by Naemoor Escort (Bennett), going to Dr. D. A. Haigh, Tucker, Ga. and Aberfeldy Helen Broadhooks by Aberfeldy Royal Robin (Gardhouse) going to Lee Johnson, Flushing, Ohio.

The figure of \$1,225 was realized by S. G. Bennett when he sold Scotsdale Wise Princess to Lee Johnson, Flushing, Ohio. \$1,200 was reached twice, once by Bennett for Scotsdale Valerie Broadhooks and once by Gardhouse for Aberfeldy Princess Erma 2nd.
