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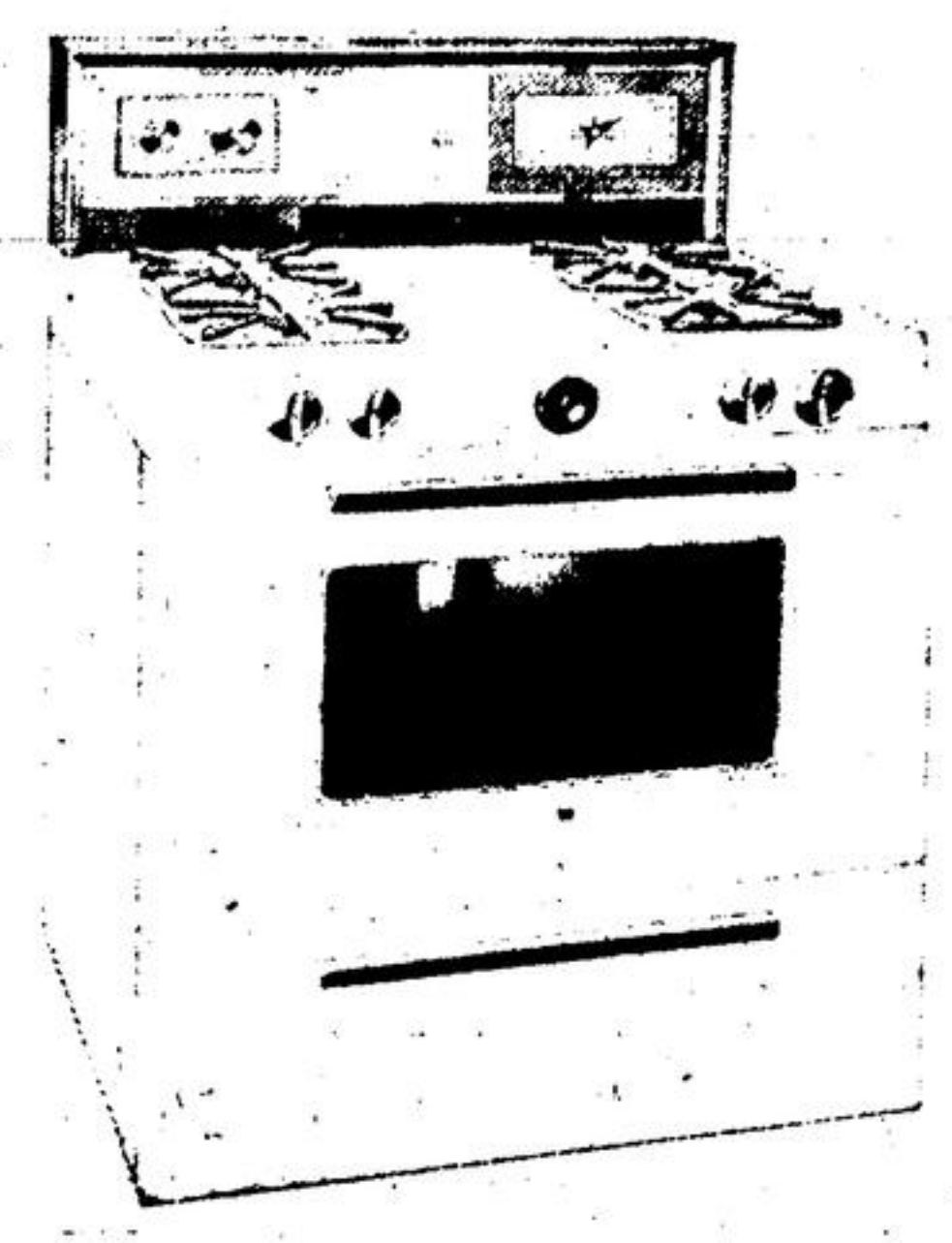
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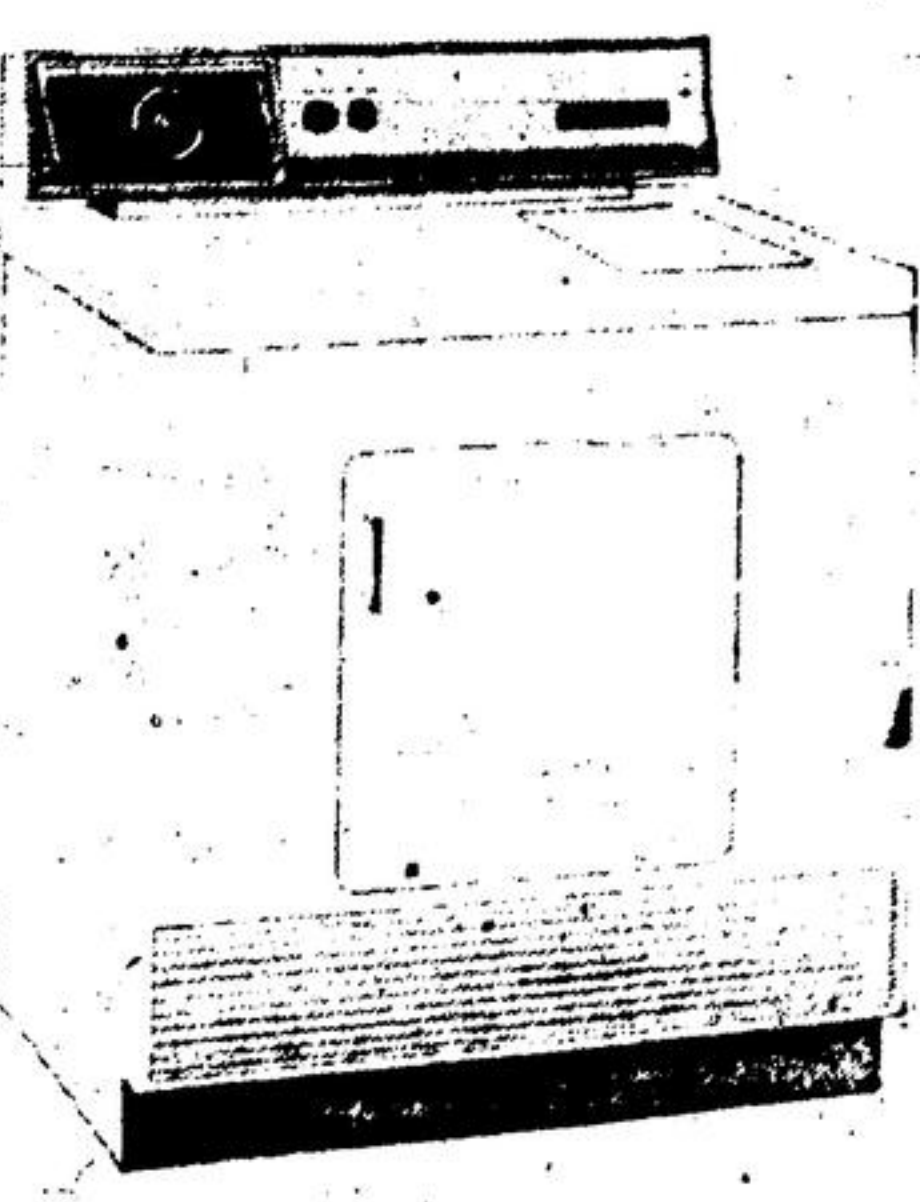
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Important announcement for electricians, air conditioning and refrigeration workers

The Apprenticeship and Tradesmen's Qualification Act, 1964 requires journeymen in the Electrical, and Air Conditioning and Refrigeration trades to obtain Certificates of Qualification by October 31st, 1966. The deadline has now been extended for six months to April 30th, 1967.

This extension does not affect the normal renewal periods for these trades which are: Electrical trade—January-February; Refrigeration & Air Conditioning—May-June. Tradesmen who have not already applied for their initial Certificates of Qualification should do so as soon as possible. Applications should be forwarded to:



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
