
Limehouse Accenters elect new officers

New school bus law needs emphasizing

Although the new law, concerning stopping for school buses, has been in effect for over a month, reports coming in to the Ontario Department of Transport indicate that the new law needs emphasizing. Thereis still confusion in the minds of some motorists.

The new rules are really not too different from the old law in that for eight years vehicles following were required to stop and vehicles approaching were required to slow down when a school bus was stopped with flashing lights.

The only change in the law is that approaching vehicles must now stop too with one ex-

Approaching vehicles are not required to stop where traffic travelling in opposite directions is separated by a physical barrier such as a paved curb, a guard rall or an unpayed med-

The school bus stopping law does not apply where the speed limit is 35 m.p.h. or less,

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
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
