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#### Three-year search

## Locates new dump property owned by town

A three-year search throughout Erin, Nassagaweya and Esquesing Townships for a new dump site for the town of Acton may soon be ended. Council has located a proposed site on their own doorstep and owned by the town.

Whether the closing of the present dump and opening of the proposed site is possible, rests with a decision of Esquesing Township council. A formal request from town council will be sent to Esquesing township council to alter the present Esquesing by-law to permit a dump on land owned by the town of Acton, located west of the older portion of the ceme-

Tuesday evening, councillor Robert Drinkwalter informed Acton council the proposed site was town-owned and would be suitable for at least 10 to 15 years. The land is located in a ravine, approximately 50 feet deep and spread across an approximate 400 foot area on land which has been termed no other use to the town.

Mayor Les Duby said town council would have to consider land fill only and eliminate all burning if the proposed site is opened. (Land fill means that all garbage dumped there would not be burned but covered over

with earth and buried.) Although the land in question is town-owned it is located in the township of Esquesing, Under a present township by-law a dump site is not permissable. A formal request will be made to have the township by-law chang-

Mr. Drinkwalter told council, his committee had met with township council and toured the site. He also noted the Halton Health Unit had approved the area as a dump. He stated Esquesing councillors at the time of the tour requested the town to make a formal request for a change in the by-law.

It was noted that an access road could be made off the extension of Mill St. W. and the entire site would probably be fenced in and controlled, with dumping only on garbage days.

A loitering by-law to prohibit persons from lounging, loitering, loafing or standing on a street or public place in a manner to obstruct received its final reading Tuesday night after a previous two reading and a clause added, "after being requested by police to move". Under terms of the new by-law, offenders can be fined a minimum of \$10 up to a maximum of \$300 exclusive of costs.

Only negative votes were registered by Reeve H. H. Hinton and councillor Doris Fryer. The reeve claimed the by-law would create more difficulty than it would solve. Councillor William Williams said he disagreed as at present police can lay a charge for loitering under the criminal code. He claimed the by-law would reinforce the act.

Councillor Earl Masales noted he had received several favorable comments from residents who thought the by-law was "ideal". Police will be asked to enforce the new by-law.

Council approved a taxi license for Len Adams, proprietor of Wiles' Bus Depot. The applicant had applied previously and was turned down on the basis he intended to use an older model car. His second application pointed out a newer vehicle had been obtained and a mechanic's certificate as well as safety sticker from the Department of Transport verified the fitness of the vehicle.

Renewal of an ambulance contract with Guelph City Ambulance came up for discussion on a three-year basis at the rate of \$9,000 for the three years. The present contract which expires

# Stop lights approved for Mill-Main corner

Traffic lights at the Mill-Main. Street intersection were approvca or Acton council Tuesday evening and the clerk-administrator instructed to obtain final approvat of design and operation of the lights from the Department of Transport. Approximate cost for lights is estimated from \$3,000 to \$3,500.

Councillor Robert Drinkwalter informed members of a meeting with Mr. Conna from the Department of Transport at which time designs for the traffic lights were reviewed and discussed. Included in the plans were parking restrictions on

The road chairman reported the following proposals: No ton II council was considering parking areas on Main St. N. on the west side back to the Dominion Hotel. An area in should consider a parking authfront of the hotel for two cars will be available for from 10 to 15 minute stops. On the east side of Main St. N., there is to be no parking within 55 feet of the pedestrian crosswalk at the intersection.

Plans also call for no parking on the west side of Main St. S. from the intersection to Church Street and on the east side of Main St. S.; within 130 feet from the intersection. On Mill St. East on the south side. parking restrictions are proposed within 120 feet from the intersection plus an additional

30 feet for the bus stop. On the north side of Mill St. East there is to be no parking within 170 feet of the intersection plus an additional 30 feet for a bus stop. In both these sections there will be restricted parking only for deliveries and stopping.

On Mill St. West on the north side, present no parking areas will remain the same and on the south side no parking areas will be designated 110 feet from the intersection. As well as the no parking restrictions the Department of Transport proposed changes to curbing and sidewalks in the area.

Approval from the Department for the light design and operation has yet to be obtained and the clerk-administrator was requested to prepare a bylaw outlining the no parking restrictions. Alterations in curbing and sidewalks will be left. until such time as the No. 25 highway changes are undertaken by the Department of High-

Within minutes after receiving the alarm Saturday at 5.15 p.m., Acton Firefighters were pouring water on a blazing house on the third line of Esquesing, opposite the town well. No one was home at the time:

The home is owned by William Dobbie and was occupied -by his daughter and son-in-law. Mr. and Mrs. George Malthy and two children, Greg age 2 and Guy, 12 months of age.

Mr. Dobbie spotted flames shooting from the roof from Lis home just down the road and rushed to the burning house. After attempting to enter the blazing and smoke-filled building, he was driven back and forced to race to his home to raise the alarm.

He then returned to the scene of the fire and was assisted by neighbors in carrying out several items of furniture and clo-
