He looked sidewise and up at me with two big question marks in his deep blue eyes. "You're looking in the wrong end," he announced and unceremoniously wrenched the Yashica around, My green-eye was still glued on the lens.

"Look through this end," he growled. "Press this button when you see what you want to photograph." With that, he left! Those words of advice ringing in my ears and one eye still intact I tripped down to the community centre bent on freeing the photographic world from the fetters of mediacrity which had held it in its grip since the mid-nineteenth century.

THE SIGHT OF A CAMERA turns some people to jelly. Others break out in a wreath of smile. Ladies adjust their bonnets, pat their hair, straighten their stockings, apply lipstick and roll their eyes. Men put their upper plates back in, assume a steelyexed pose, quote verbatim from Horace Greely and make out they don't wanta be in any picture.

I sauntered in the rink prepared for them all. I casually asked the team's manager and coach to pose for a picture. They acceeded to my requests. When I decided to take some action shots of the team practicing, I ran into some difficulty.

If I leaned over one side of the boards the play went to the other side. If I went to one end the players went to another end. I was beginning to get the idea these guys didn't want to hang in the National Gallery or alongside the hockey immortals in Maple Leaf Gardens.

When one smart defenseman skated by and velled, "Which side of my profile do ya want," I got the impression he was putting me on, Perhaps, I thought, I should've started out on cheesecake instead of these thankless, rough and tumble hockey players. How could I put the ballet, then, on film when they persisted in belting each other through the boards.

With a last look and a hasty snap shot of all the players chasing the puck I packed the whole thing up and with cords banging from my neck, my arms akimbo, I made my exit determined to turn my talents to some other pursuit where they'd be more appreciated



"Say," he said, "you take those hockey pictures in this week's paper?" I nodded, expecting a big pat on the back. "Well are you ever in for it," he chortled," one of the wives of a guy in the picture saw it and she's hoppin' mad."

"Whaddya mean?" I asked. "She says her guy don't look as bad as that and anybody that'd take a picture like that shouldn't have a camera in his hands.

Wait'll she sees you, she'll break every bone in your body". I've developed a nervous habit of looking over my shouder for a vengeful female. I clipped a copy of West Fountain's magazine article, "Shoot - but don't kill" which I intend to send to the trate lady. Meanwhile my photographic career has collapsed in shreds.


