## Grandmother will represent Canadian motherhood Nov. 11

A great grandmother from Toronto, who mothered hundreds of young servicemen during the war but lost her husband and four children, represents Canadian motherhood in Ottawa on November 11.

Mrs. Ann Stephens will join the official party at the national Remembrance ceremony and will carry the burden and the pride of all mothers who lost sons in war as she lays a wreath at the National Cenotaph.

"Each night I pray for peace so other mothers around the world won't have to make the sacrifice I did," she said when informed of her selection by the Royal Canadian Legion.

Mrs. Stephens — during the war she was Mrs. Colville — had three sons in the R.C.A.F. All were pilots. All were killed. Her husband and a daughter also died, all during a three year period.

Ft./Sgt. William Colville, 25,

was the first son to die. He was killed in a flying accident in 1942 while flying Hudsons with No. 6 Bombing and Reconnaissance Squadron. He is buried at Gander.

F/O. Alexander Colville, 28, was on his fifth operation with No. 408 Squadron, flying Lancaster out of England on the night of March 16, 1944. The target was Stuttgart. The plane was missing after reaching the target. Alexander's name and that of 20,455 Commonwealth airmen — is commemorated on the Runwmede memorial at those who flew out from the United Kingdom and have no known grave.

F/O. John "Sandy" Colville, 24, flew Typhoons with No. 440 Squadron. He was shot down by flak near Falaise, France, in August 1944. Sandy — who once tried out for the Toronto Argos — is buried in a Canadian cemetery at Betteville-sur-Laizre.

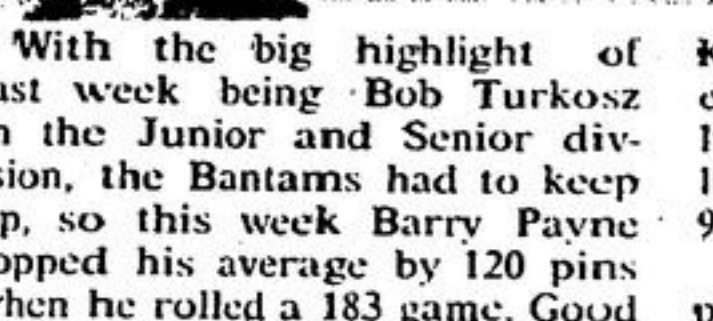
