

Community Services Council begins volunteer work Nov. 1

On November 1 the new Community Services Council began to function. There are five services offered, on recommendation of a doctor or clergyman — transportation to and from hospital; emergency baby-sitting;

social companionship; home-making and clothing for emergency cases.

There is an immediate need for good used clothing in good repair and shoes for children. Donations of clothing may be given to Mrs. D. I. Engel, Mrs. Joe Bray or Mrs. Ritchie McMurray of the executive. The clothing is being stored upstairs in the town hall.

There is also an urgent need for drivers who will drive in, Toronto or Hamilton. It is in the category of transportation that the newly-formed services council received its first calls. The organization of this volunteer group began last spring. Sheets were distributed at all churches and filled out by volunteers. Conveners were named for each section who can provide assistance speedily if requested.

Donations have covered the few expenses so far. The group operates with the approval of council, clerk, doctors and clergy. It covers areas not taken care of by other service clubs or town welfare, including emergencies. There are no regular meetings.

Similar groups operate with success in many other centres.
