Several cases of re-assessment came before council and also cases of tax refunds, some being approved and others rejected.

It was moved that the 1966 assessment roll for 1967 taxation be confirmed as revised and the court adjourned.

Salary, holiday and dumping problems tackled by council

Monday, Nov. 7, was a night for "little jobs" at Nassagaweya Township council. A multitude of little problems were taken care of, as council met for close to three hours.

Clerk J. C. McIntyre and the Road Superintendent Grant McMillan were requested to bring in recommendations on salary schedules and working conditions of the Township's administration and roads staff. The recommendations will be studied at the next regular meeting of council, enabling council to make recommendations to the 1967 council. It was suggested this should be done so that the job would be easier for the new council at its inaugural meeting.

In keeping with the plan, council approved an interim increase of \$10 per month to Sam Scott, the custodian for the administration building. Mr. Scott requested a \$20 increase.

After a lengthy discussion, council unanimously approved granting a holiday to road department employees on Remembrance Day, November 11. Road Superintendent McMillan said the road department employees wanted to know whether or not they would be granted a holiday. Halton County road department employees receive a holiday on the date and on that

basis, council agreed to give them a holiday. Deputy Reeve William Hoey suggested holidays should be negotiated at the start of the year, not a few days before the holidays occur. Council members unanimously agreed.

Delinquent dumping in the township cropped up again, when it was learned a man had dumped a 400 gallon tank in the township. Apparently the tank was soon removed by another man, but the problem still bothered council. W. A. Johnson was commended for his actions in reporting the dumping episode to the Police, and Clerk J. C. McIntyre was instructed to contact the O.P.P. and write a letter to the "delinquent dumper," warning him that if such a thing happens in the future he will be charged.
