If this idea helps solve a shopping problem, give our Business Office a call by dialing "0". We'll Christmas-wrap and deliver the telephone of your choice, and arrange to return and connect it later when most convenient.

Just a reminder to anyone planning to make overseas calls during the busy holiday periods of December 24-26 and December 31 to January 2. Advance reservations for such calls will be taken starting Monday, November 28 from 9:00 a.m. To reserve a call, just ask your Long Distance Operator to connect you with the Overseas Operator for the country that you wish to call. The Overseas Operator can then arrange all the details of the call with you. If at all possible, it's a good idea to make the calls before or after two peak calling periods. That way no reservations are necessary and your call should go through quickly and easily.

"TELEPHONE OPERATORS ARE NOT PERMITTED TO REPORT AT THIS BUILDING AT ANY HOUR OF DAY OR NIGHT IN BICYCLE COSTUME." Believe it or not, that's a quotation from a telephone company bulletin dated 1895. sley for the Province of Ontario.

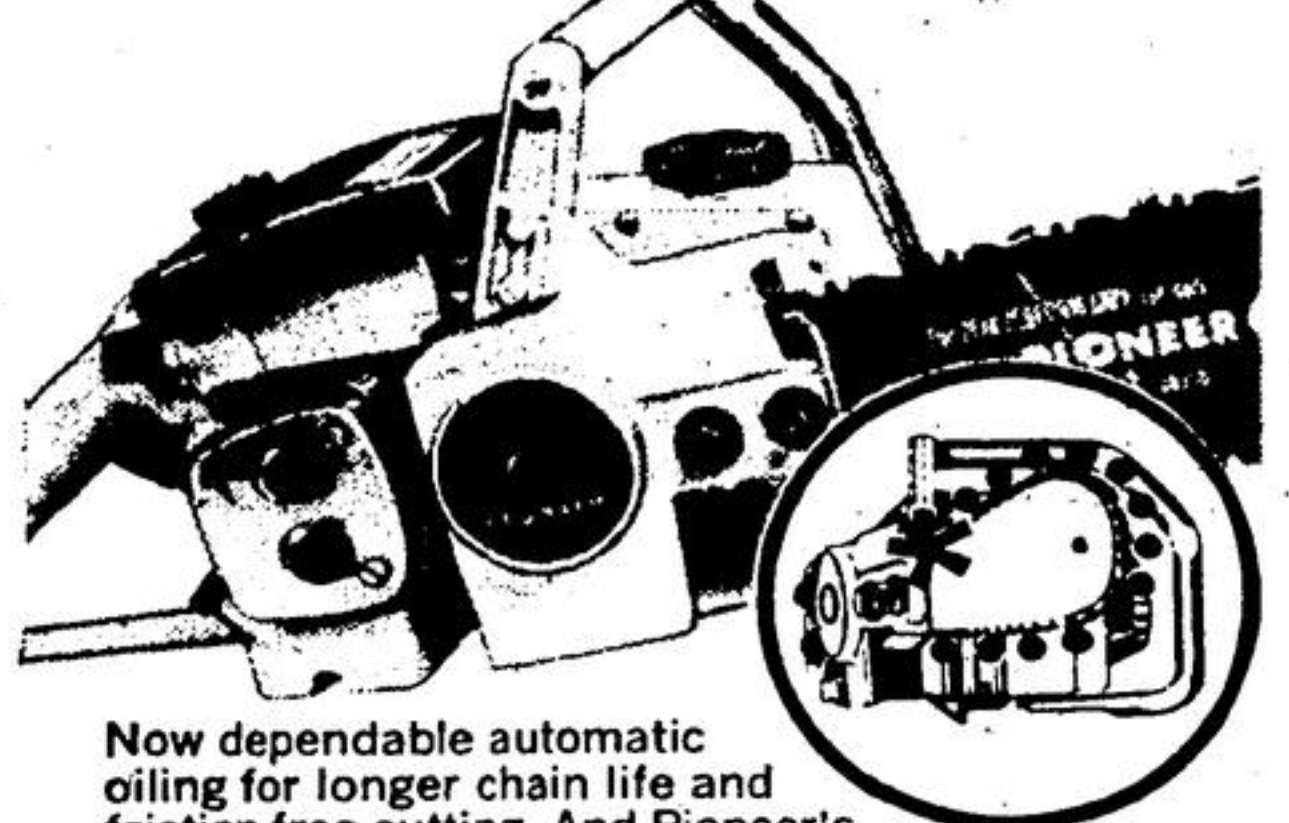
