FIRST LOOK AT THE 1966-67 edition of the Tanners in action against two of the league's five teams clearly shows the Acton club is a contender. But they'll have their hands full with every club in the group.

There are no weak sisters among the entries. It was obvious from Friday night's opener Hespeler will as strong as last year. They, in turn, lost to the powerful Seaforth club in their first game at home.

Orangeville, the current cellar dwellers with three losses in as many starts, supplied stiff opposition to the Tanners before bowing 43 in a game which ended up with two Acton players making a trip to the hospital. Bob Marshall, who went with Murray Marchment and Jim Cunningham to sick bay, covered with blood, was also mistaken for a patient.

The blood was the result of a donnybrook in the penalty box between Marchment of the Tanners and Milton of Orangeville, with Bob in the middle. Milton lost most of his front teeth in the scuffle while Marchment suffered a seven stitch gash on his wrist. Jim Cunningham was struck in the eye by a flying stick, making his trip to the hospital necessary.

The Tanners, meanwhile, used Paul Bodendistel for the first time Monday and had George Grasby and Jim Sweeney in the lineup following Friday's mix-up which barred four of the Guelph area players from playing. The team will not be able to use Wayne Hilson and it's doubtful whether Jim Farrelly will be allowed to play but clearances are expected for Sweeney and Bodendistel.

The O.H.A. made no bones about it. They intend to enforce the residence regulations for every team in the league. It's causing some confusion right now but in the long run it will work out best for everyone concerned providing it is enforced impartially.

CONVENER BOB MARSHALL was informed this week the O.H.A. will not press attempts to include Clinton and Durham in the present five team Int. B grouping.

Apparently the entire plot was the project of the northern convener, who evidently didn't consult the Clinton team about its wishes. Further O.H.A. investigation revealed Clinton did not relish playing in this league. Too strong, they said. The O.H.A. left it up to convener Marshall to make the decision after con-

ferring with the existing teams, Earlier in the season the league would gladly have welcomed two more entries but at this late date with the schedule made up and partly played, expansion would have created confusionand many headaches. Plans were also underway for an extension of the schedule when the request came through. The league intends to add eight more games for each team to the present 16.

It was decided further expansion was not possible this season but urged the O.H.A. to solicit entries early next year so these problems would not crop up.

IF THERE WAS ANY DOUBT about which team in the Eastern football conference was most qualified to be in the Grey Cup game it should have been dispelled Saturday. Hamilton Ti-Cats reputed to be the second-best team in the east, were no match for Ottawa Rough Riders.

Ti-Cats, laboring under a 29 point deficit on the two-game, total-point series, and a reputation as the original come-back heroes, had to gamble early in the game on scoring a touchdown which would ignite their offense, such as it is. Rider coach Frank. Clair was prepared for just such an eventuality. He knew the Tabbies would gamble on the long ball so he dispersed his forces to match the need.

An interception of Hamilton's first desperate throw was all that was needed. Ottawa galloped over for a touchdown and you might say the jig was up for the steel city snarlers from that point. Their vaunted defense could not cope with the giant Ottawa line and Russ Jackson, a Hamilton native, who slipped through Ti-Cat fingers, incidentally, rubbed the memory of previous defeats from the books with another peerless performance. When the game was in the bag Clair took him out for a substitute who continued to spur the Rider attack.

The real big game will come this Saturday in Vancouver when the eastern Rough Riders meet the western Roughriders for the Grey Cup. Ottawa is favored to cart the cup back to the nation's capital on the strength of their last two performances. That's who this fuzzy faced one prefers, although the western reps will be a much better club than Hamilton.

Mic Macs spoil home team debut

Hespeler Mic Macs scored three second period goals in a span of less than two minutes, erasing a 3-1 Acton lead, Friday night. Then they went on to pin a 6-4 defeat on the Tanners in front of 400 first night hockey


Home debut for the 1966-67 season and the reintroduction of O.H.A. intermediate hockey in Acton for the first time in 16 years, Mic Macs spoiled both occasions for the Tanners. They checked them into the ice once they grabbed the lead.

For the first period and a half it looked like the Tanners would follow the familiar first night pattern by pinning a defeat on the visitors. Midway through the second period they wilted and before you could pat the top of your hat the fast skating Hespeler crew pulled ahead.

They added two third period goals to put the game in the bag. Acton scored one more in the last seconds of play with Hespeler shorthanded.

"Your guys played like our team did in their first game against Seaforth," one Hespeler official said after the game. The Tanners tried hard, moved the puck well, but between Jack (Waldo) Watson in the Mic Mac mesh and a loose défense, they couldn't cope with the hustling Hespeler crew.

Added to their woes was a pregame directive from the O.H.A. telling the club not to use either Jim Sweeney or Jim Farrelly of last year's club, and Paul Boden. distel and Wayne Hilson, two new faces, until further checks were made on their place of residence. This played havoc with the line-up and freshman coach Fred Kentner was forced to juggle his line in an effort to

Edge Duffs 4-3 Monday in blood and thunder duel

Rebounding from their loss in Friday's opener, Acton Tannersedged Orangeville Dufferins 4-3 Monday night in a blood and thunder O.H.A. Int, B battle on their bailiwick.

A gruelling, bruising contest with players on both teams carrying their sticks and elbows high, the Tanners traded goals with Dufferins over the second and third periods before rookie Jan Riddall drilled the winning goal, his second, at 13.27 of the third period. Unlike the previous three times the Tanners were ahead. Orangeville could not overcome the one goal margin and the Acton club had its first win in two starts.

Goalle Jim Sweeney was back in the nets for the Tanners, He played an outstanding game, especially with the Acton club shorthanded. Dufferins were on the short end of the 21 penalties handed out as well as the score, serving nine of them, which gave the ample opportunities to bother Sweeney.

Players on both teams indulged in stick swinging episodes. Frayed tempers erupted at 12.25 of the second period with the teams tied at 1-1. Referee Ron Breen assessed delenseman Murray Marchment of the Tanners and Don Milton of Orangeville two minutes apiece for their own personal vendetta. The pair hardly reached the penalty box when they resumed where they left off on the ice. Milton, on the receiving end
