

## Sell parts of two roads to Authority for \$15,000

Rockwood — Immediately the Eramosa Township Council met for their general business and to read and discuss the engineer's report on the Flewelling Municipal Drain. All the parties assessed within the area described in the petition who were notified of the meeting as provided for in section 17 of the Municipal Drainage Act, were present in person or by representation. The reeve called the meeting to order and the engineer's report, specifications, plan and profile, schedule of assessments and estimated costs were read and discussed at some length.

Mr. Gamsby of Gamsby and Mannerow, professional engineers, explained his findings of the survey and answered many questions regarding the report. It was moved and seconded that the engineer's report on the Flewelling Municipal Drain be returned to the engineer for further revision and consideration be given to having a closed tile ditch in place of an open ditch.

The meeting then adjourned and reconvened at 7:30 when several items of correspondence were discussed and the minutes of the last regular meeting and special meeting were read and adopted.

A nominating committee of D. McPhedran, D. Bacon and R. Hamilton were appointed to ask for directors to the Eramosa Recreation Committee.

The clerk was instructed to notify a ratepayer about his dogs running at large and to notify the Wellington-Dufferin Health Unit about some unsatisfactory living accommodations in the township.

Severance of a portion of land from Earl Brown to the Rockwood Cemetery Board was agreeable to Council and will be recommended to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and the Provincial Department of Health for approval. Three other land severances were also approved by Council and will be recommended to the Minister of Municipal Affairs for approval.

A by-law for requiring buildings and yards to be put in a safe condition against fire or other dangerous risk or accident and to repeal By-law 5-1965, was given the necessary readings, passed and numbered 24-1966. A by-law to authorize the issue of a debenture in the principal amount of \$365,000 for public school purposes was given first, second and third readings, passed and numbered 25-1966.

A by-law for stopping up and selling to the Grand River Conservation Authorities, for the sum of \$15,000, all those parts of Fall St. and Valley Rd. in the village of Rockwood as per registered description M-7638, was read a third time, passed and numbered 26-1966.

It was moved and seconded that the Eramosa Council, at the request of the trustees of the village of Rockwood, request that the Ontario Water Resources Commission prepare and present a proposal to the township for the construction of water supply in the village, a provincially owned project including a rate on a usage basis to meet all the costs involved under the provincial program, and an appropriate form of contract.

Also that the Eramosa Council, at the request of the trustees of the village of Rockwood,

request the Ontario Water Resources Commission to prepare and present a proposal to the township of Eramosa for the construction of main sewer works and water supply facilities in the village as a provincially owned project including a rate on a usage basis to meet all the costs involved under the provincial program, and an appropriate form of contract.

It was moved that council express their appreciation to the Wellington County Road Committee and engineer for the curb and storm sewer job in the village completed in 1966. The tender of Arnold Duffield, being the lowest tender received, was accepted for mounting the township sander. Tender price is \$25 for stripping and remounting the dump box, \$5 per hour with driver, \$3 per hour without driver and \$2 per day stand-by. The acceptance of this tender is subject to the approval of the Department of Highways.

The road superintendent was authorized to call for tenders for a new township sander, tenders to be in the hands of the clerk by 12 o'clock noon, November 21. Accounts amounting to \$35,899.51 were passed for payment and the meeting adjourned to meet on December 12 at 1 p.m. at the call of the reeve.

This being the last regular meeting of council before the nomination meeting on November 25 at 1 p.m., the council was called on for the usual valedictory speeches. The reeve, deputy reeve and the councillors stated that they would seek re-election for 1967, if the ratepayers so desired.

## Nominations for Esquesing

Esquesing township ratepayers will be asked to name candidates for reeve, deputy-reeve, three councillors and two school board members at the annual nomination meeting next Monday at Stewarttown Community Hall.

Nominations will be received from 7:30 p.m. until 8:30 p.m. after which reports to ratepayers will be given from council and school boards.

In the event an election is necessary, it will be held Monday, December 5 throughout the township.
