The increasing use of chemical pesticides prompts the Department of Lands and Forests to warn citizens to be extremely careful in their use.

While most people are careful not to endanger themselves in the use of pesticides, they tend to be careless in regard to wildlife.

Care should be taken especially near water. Many good fishing areas have been ruined by pesticides, and many forms of animal life die due to the indiscriminate use of these poisons.

We know of a local landowner who lost all the fish in a stocked pond because of carelessness in the use of spray. The pond was located along the road and shortly after the roadside was sprayed by the township the fish began to die.

These were speckled trout weighing up to three pounds. This naturally represented quite a financial loss since more than 100 fish were killed.

We join the Department of Lands and Forests in urging caution in the use of pesticides.

A blue winged teal was shot recently by a duck hunter in Motatun, Venezuela that had been banded in Fort William Harbour a year ago.

Losses due to forest fires in Ontario this year were far below average. Although there was an increase in the number of fires, the average loss was 7.5 acres per fire and the total acreage burnt was one of the lowest in recent years.

Forest protection officials say the low losses are due to prompt detection and trained firefighters using modern equipment.

The general public was also commended for prompt reporting of fires.

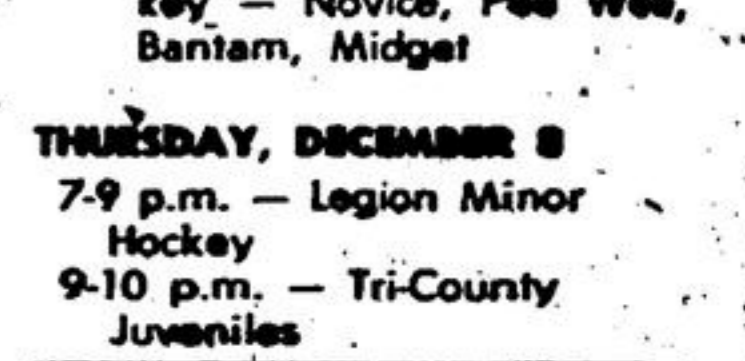
