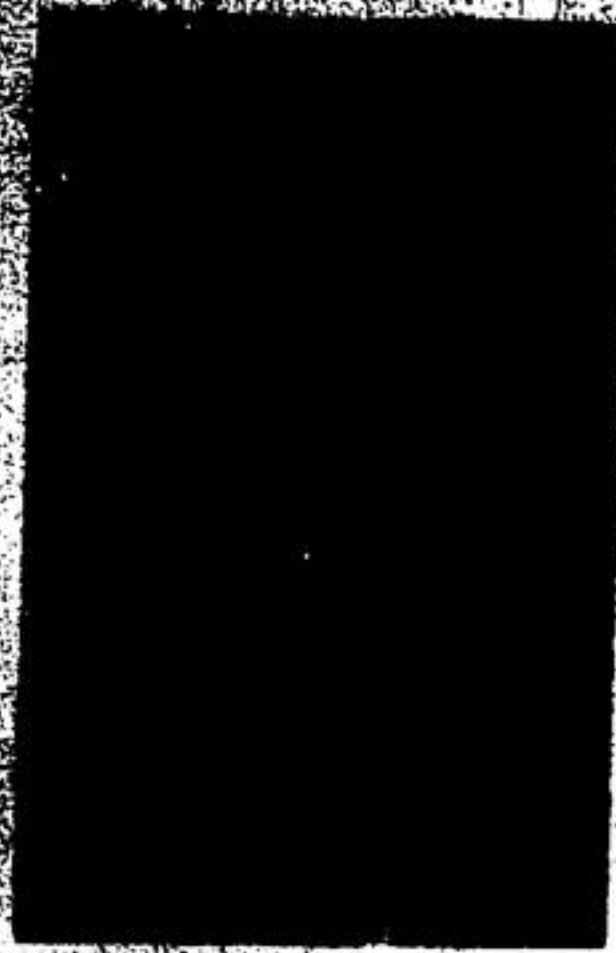

Police urge caution for winter driving

For the second week since the inauguration of a new "public relations" system, Acton police report on their week's activities.

During the week, Sunday November 20, to Saturday, November 26, inclusive, members of the Acton Municipal Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police, during 176 working hours, patrolled 681 miles in the town of Acton. Results included 10 charges being laid and 11 warnings being issued, all pursuant to the Highway Traffic Act of Ontario.

A total of \$210 damage was recorded in the investigation of two motor vehicle accidents. No one was injured.

Four other calls were received including one minor theft, now under investigation, and a disturbance at a local restaurant.

Detachment members attended both Magistrate's Court and Juvenile Court in Milton during the week. Two traffic and three liquor convictions were registered.

Parking habits of local drivers

are always under close scrutiny. Acton citizens are reminded that local by-law 945 prohibits both overnight parking on town streets and improper parking in any manner. Where deemed necessary, the by-law will be invoked.

With the advent of winter apparent this week, we urge you to adjust your driving habits accordingly. Cpl. Ray Mason says. Proper operation of a motor vehicle on slippery snow or ice covered streets requires far greater patience and skill than ordinary spring, summer and fall driving.
