Two museums

Call meeting to discuss future Kelso development

A special meeting of all agencies concerned with the Kelso Conservation Area is being called by the Halton Region Conservation Authority — to discuss the area's future development.

Although a move is underway to move the existing Halton County Museum closer to a proposed new provincial agricultural museum incorporating a permanent home for the Stearns-Era promoters, the Authority at the same meeting agreed the Halton Museum was free to go ahead with plans for a central building in its present area.

The County Museum is located west of the Duff Alexander house near the west end of the 450-acre Kelso complex, and includes a barn which was converted to a museum, part of the Alexander house, blacksmith shop, pig shed and just over five acres of land.

Recently the Authority bought the adjoining 143-acre Archie Service farm at the east end of Kelso Conservation Area, facing the Town Line north of Milton Heights. The provincial government has purchased 60 acres of this property for a provincial agricultural museum.

A centennial building has been planned by the Halton Museum Board, and the \$30,000 structure would be located in front of the converted barn which serves as a museum showroom and workshop. According to Field Officer Dave Murray, the Authority gave written approval for the new project at their last meeting, although the letter was sent out too late to be read at the Museum Board's last meeting.

A committee report calling for a get-together of all the agencies concerned with Kelso's future development, pointed out the benefits of co-operation between the present museum and

the proposed museum so that duplication and extra costs could be avoided. The Authority voted 6-5 with the chairman casting the deciding vote, to go ahead with plans for such a meeting.

TO RIVAL DISNEYLAND
