Mr. Parker also spoke of an entirely new concept in water control which is planned for the near future. This involves dredging the 15 to 20 existing small reservoirs in the water-

shed to their original depth. First of these schemes has already been presented to the Department of Energy and resources Management for their approval. This involves deepening Fairy Lake at Acton. If this is successful many more should follow.

When these reservoirs are deepened they will provide as much water storage capacity as the Orangeville Reservoir, Mr. Parker said.
