

The new pews, made by the Globe Church Furniture Company of Waterloo, are a light polished oak with engraved crosses at the end of each pew and the front panels contain pullman seats for the children. These new light oak pews enhance the beauty of the interior of the church as does the new sacrificial altar, that was added a couple of years ago, in the Sanctuary, in keeping with the decrees of Vatican Council II. The Council brought about the celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass with the priest facing the congregation, instead of as in the past celebrating Mass with his back to the people. Hence the need for the Sacrificial Altar, which depicts the Last Supper in the front panel of the Altar.
