

From north-south boundary, county asks

Halton County Council's special committee dealing with the Plunkett report, recommends the retaining of north-south boundaries, when final action is taken on the local government review.

Council accepted the report of the committee consisting of Warden H. H. Hinton and the deputy-reeves of municipalities, at the final meeting of 1966, held last week in the County Administration Building.

In its concluding remarks, the committee suggested, "your committee agrees with the report with the exception of the proposed boundary change."

The committee had sent questionnaires to the municipalities in the county, requesting recommendations. Although not all municipalities had been heard from, the report contained the general feeling of most submissions received.

In the brief outline prepared by the special committee, it was stated:

- Boundaries are not acceptable as suggested by Mr. Plunkett.
- Education proposals are not acceptable, particularly pertaining to boundaries.
- The committee favors a one-tier system of government.
- Future growth is dependent on good planning and available services.
- The committee favors representation by population and that a direct election be conducted by the people for the one-tier system of government.
- The committee agrees with the report with regards





Mrs. Knox, the bride's mother, chose a two-piece blue suit, blue feathered hat and a white gardenia.


Leaving on a honeymoon to the east and into the States, the bride wore a turquoise woollen suit with white crepe blouse and a corsage of pink mums and roses.


