Four Reeves, H. H. Hinton of Acton, Herb Merry of Oakville, Gordon Gallagher of Burlington and George Leslie of Esquesing and one deputy-reeve, George Currie of Esquesing, have held the cherished position at some time between 1936 and 1967.
Deputy-Reeve Currie, returning to County Council after an absence of several years, was warden of the county in 1936 when he was Reeve of Esquesing. Current Esquesing Reeve George Leslie was warden in 1953. Gordon Gallagher was warden in 1964. Herb Merry in 1965 and H. H. Hinton in 1966.

other amendment. "I'm in favor of getting the official plan approved but we would be neglecting our duty if we don't file proof why the van der Kook property should be rezoned," emphasized councillor Drinkwater.
A resolution was approved unanimously to request Mr. van der Kooij to submit a letter to the department giving valid reasons why his property should be rezoned. The letter will receive the support of council.
A second resolution calling for deletion of the van der Kooij application from council's original submission to the department was defeated with only the reeve voting in the affirmative.
Council members viewed sketch plans for renovations to the town office to include the present library room and agreed to have councillor F. G. Oakes and the clerk present the plans to the Y.M.C.A. Board for its approval and obtain a rental agreement.
If this is done the clerk was empowered to obtain costs for the renovations from the architect.
In future, council members will be requested to submit a signed form before being paid mileage allowances. In the past the clerk was empowered to include the payment on the financial report for payment.
Councillor Earl Masales at a previous meeting had queried these mileage payments without a signature from the person involved and was of the opinion the clerk shouldn't be held responsible for these payments.
Regular appointments made during the meeting included: R. R. Parker as Acton's representative on the Credit Valley Conservation Authority for 1967; Chester Anderson for a two-year term on Acton District High School board and Neil Miller to a three-year term on Planning Board.
Council approved a by-law to reduce the number of members of the Recreation Committee from 10 to five members and made the following appointments, John Goy, Harold Townsley, Hugh Patterson, Brendan Aherne and Mrs.

Harry Otterbein. The same group will act as Parks Board members for the following terms: Goy, three years; Townsley, three years; Patterson, two years; Otterbein, two years and Aherne, one year. (These names had been submitted to council by the recreation committee and parks board.)
Following a recommendation by No. 1 committee council accepted the bid from Morgan, Ostigui and Hudson Ltd, a Toronto Bonding House, at \$8.67 per \$100 for debenture issues for \$78,492 Centennial library.
It was also agreed to sell the \$30,000 watermain debentures to local residents at the same rate.
During enquiries by members, councillor Mrs. Doris Fryer welcomed the new members and extended best wishes for their term of office. She expressed appreciation to members for their co-operation during the past year.
Mayor Dury expressed regret that Mrs. Fryer had not been re-elected for another term and thanked her for her

Spoooner justifies county travel funds
Expenditures by the 1965 Halton County Council on entertainment, conventions and travel were covered by effective legislation, the Hon. J. W. Spoooner, Minister of Municipal Affairs, said in a letter to Oakville clerk S. A. Featherston.
Mr. Spoooner said a resolution sent to him by Oakville Council failed to recognize that expenditures under certain sections of the Municipal Act approved "expenditures for travelling and other expenses of the officers and servants of the municipality while travelling on normal business of the municipality."
The Oakville resolution stated that "section 410 of the Municipal Act limits a county's expenditures for entertaining

guests and for travelling on civic business to a sum not exceeding \$2,500 in any one year."
The Minister said the auditor, W. H. Matthews, had also failed to take into consideration paragraphs 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14 of section 377 of the Municipal Act when he was preparing his statement. He said the total amount of expenditures that were limited to \$2,500 under the terms of the Municipal Act amounted to \$2,247, according to Mr. Matthews and county clerk Garfield Brown.
So-called "county fun-funds" have been attacked in the press and by Oakville council following the release of the auditor's report.
