# Township appointees make annual report

The submission of annual reports by Township council appointees highlighted the final meeting of Nassagaweya council for 1966.

Council appointees to various boards and groups reported to council on activities during the year and received a hearty vote of thanks from Reeve W. J. Coulter, Deputy Reeve Hoey and councillors Ross Gordon, Mrs. Anne MacArthur and William Mahon.

School attendance officer Stan Norrish reported he had made eight trips during the year and had travelled 86 miles on school business. One work permit was issued.

Charles Thomson and Jack Milne, appointees to the Acton Fire Area Board, were present. Mr. Thomson said the Acton Brigade had answered 40 calls in the rural areas — Esquing and Nassagaweya. He said the board was considering purchasing new uniforms over a four year period and each uniform costs about \$75. Deputy Reeve Hoey, who lives in the area serviced by the Acton Brigade, said he had found the brigade to be "very efficient".

Mr. Thomson, council's appointee to the newly formed Grand Valley Conservation Authority, said the '66 budget for the Authority was \$566,000.

Ross Carbert, appointee to the Milton District High School Board, could not attend since he was attending a high school board meeting. However, he will submit a report at the first meeting of the year.

# Archie Service, the appointee to the Milton Area Fire Board, said it looked as though the board would have a \$4,000 surplus on 1966 operations. The surplus he explained would be put into a reserve fund and would be used to purchase new equipment when necessary. Nassagaweya contributes 12.5 per cent to the Milton Fire Area Board's budget.

Duncan Moffatt, the Township's representative on the Acton District High School Board had given an annual report at the Township nomination meeting, however he did attend the last meeting. He said the board did not anticipate building until 1970.
