Guelph Assembly for area Witnesses

A Guelph audience of 1,195,

including several Acton realdents, Sunday afternoon assembled to hear Joseph Scaglione, district supervisor of Jehovah's Witnesses in Southern Ontario, deliver a public address as the climax of the three-day assembly in Guelph.
