Lengthy inaugural meeting Eramosa township council

Rockwood—Eramosa Township Council met recently for their inaugural meeting. After the oath of office they became fully constituted council for the year 1967 as follows: Reeve Cameron Lush, Deputy Reeve Fred Cox and Councillors Earl McKenzie, Duncan McPhedran and James Milne.

Rev. A. Gardner of the Rockwood United Church opened the meeting with Scripture, prayer and an interesting address.

The Reeve in his inaugural address, welcomed council and stressed the importance of Centennial Year.

The minutes of the inaugural meeting of the Eramosa Council held at Centre Inn on January 21, 1967 were read and the Council for that year consisted of Reeve John Duffield, deputy-reeve John Rae, councillors William Farris, John Dickieson and John McKerrin. The clerk was John Davidson.

The meeting adjourned with the members of council, road superintendent Robert Hamilton and Clerk Lloyd Hindley being the dinner guests of Reeve and Mrs. Lush. Deputy-reeve Fred Cox thanked the host and hostess for their hospitality and Mrs. Lush was presented with a lovely bouquet of flowers.

The afternoon council meeting reconvened at 1:30 p.m. when they discussed a two year contract with Mrs. Bogue and Mr. Hollinger. Council agreed to a two year contract at the cost of \$700 per year and the provincial government will subsidize the township 50 per cent. Several items of correspondence were ordered filed while others were read and discussed.

It was moved that a by-law to appoint poundkeeper, fence-viewers and livestock valuers, be given first and second readings. The clerk was instructed to notify all such persons and anyone not wishing to accept the appointment, to notify the clerk within 10 days.

A by-law authorizing the reeve and treasurer to borrow from the Royal Bank, Rockwood, a sum not exceeding \$150,000, was given the necessary readings, passed and numbered 1-1967.

Council designated Councillors McPhedran and Milne to attend the meeting with the Eramosa Township School Board concerning the disposition of the old Rockwood School.

Council accepted with regret the resignation of Franklin Armstrong as Eramosa's representative on the Fergus

Hospital Board and the Council conveyed appreciation. Council decided they would not appoint a representative to the Fergus Hospital Board at this time.

The selectors of jurors are to be paid \$5 and the clerk \$10 upon receipt of certificate from the Clerk of the Peace.

A by-law to appoint certain officials for the township and to fix their remuneration, the remuneration of the council, and rates to be paid other employees of the township was introduced and later passed. The blanks were filled in as follows: clerk-treasurer, L. T. Hindley, salary \$4200, mileage \$100; building inspector, J. J. Hewitt, \$250 per hour plus 10c per mileage; deputy-reeve \$75 plus \$15 per meeting plus 10c mileage; councillors \$15 per meeting plus 10c mileage; road employees, G. Gray \$2.15 per hour, D. Bacon \$2 per hour, G. Millson \$2 per hour; winter employees \$1.65 per hour, laborers \$1.50 per hour.

The first special meeting of the year began that evening when council reconvened at 8 p.m. to hear the revised engineer's report on the Flewelling drain. All council members were present and the reeve presided. Also in attendance were D. Gamsby, P. Eng. Messrs. Cargo, Flewelling, Bard, the road superintendent and the clerk.

The revised report was discussed and Mr. Gamsby brought to the attention of those concerned proposed provincial legislation which would extend the provincial grant from 33 1/2 to 66 2/3 per cent of the total cost of a drain. As everybody present was agreeable with the revised report, the following motion was passed: That a by-law to provide for a drainage works in the township of Eramosa, and for borrowing on the credit of the municipality the sum of \$8,260, for completing the said works, be introduced and read a first and second time. Following this hearing, the council reconvened for general business.

It was moved that at the request and concurrence of the trustees of the village of Rockwood, the council of the Township of Eramosa hereby auth-

orizes the costs will be borne by the municipality for preliminary engineering by the Ontario Water Resources Commission.

The treasurer was authorized to pay the 1967 membership fees of \$20 to the Association of Ontario Mayors and Reeve.

The treasurer was authorized to pay the fee of the Ontario Rural Municipalities of \$15 and the Ontario Good Roads Association of \$15 and the clerk to reserve rooms at the King Edward Hotel and the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, for the council and officials.

The clerk was instructed to advertise for a dog control officer for the Township whose duties would be to distribute the dog tags, collect the dog licences and to be available to pick up stray dogs. Applications to be in Monday, February 6.

It was moved that the road superintendent be instructed to advertise for the supplying, crushing and delivering of 10,000 cubic yards, more or less, of crushed gravel to the township roads. Tenders to be in by 12 noon, February 6.

The road superintendent was also authorized to engage Gamsby and Mannerow to do the plans, profiles and specifications for a culvert on No. 20 Sideroad between the second and third concessions.

Application is to be made to the Department of Transport, to have automatic flashing signals installed on the C.N.R. crossing on the third line of Eramosa and the costs be shared in the usual manner.

The reeve and clerk were authorized to execute an agreement with Vermay Enterprises Ltd. for ambulance service for 1967 and 1968 for \$700 per year. Service calls are to be \$15 per call plus 50 cent mileage one way from Guelph limits. Council requested the Department of Highways to allow the purchase of the new "Brantford" sanding unit, recently delivered, be charged to the 1967 road expenditure by-law, rather than to the supplementary road expenditure by-law for 1966. The reeve, clerk-treasurer and the road superintendent are to make application to the Department of Highways

for the balance of the 1966 road subsidy.

Council authorized the purchase of an Underwood Calculating Machine and Diplomat Photo-Copier machine for the use of the clerk-treasurer and the road superintendent. Fred Duffield was re-appointed to the Guelph Suburban District High School Board for the years 1967 and 1968.

A Centennial plaque is to be purchased from Jas. H. Matthews Co. Milton, for delivery by April 1 at \$115. The resignation of Archie Lowe from the Eramosa Planning Board was accepted with regret and the following appointments made: Ted Cargo for the year 1967, Gordon Cox for the years 1967, 1968 and 1969 and Ron Martin for the years 1967, 1968 and 1969.

Accounts amounting to \$93,589.71 were passed for payment and the meeting adjourned to meet on Monday, February 6 or at the call of the reeve.
