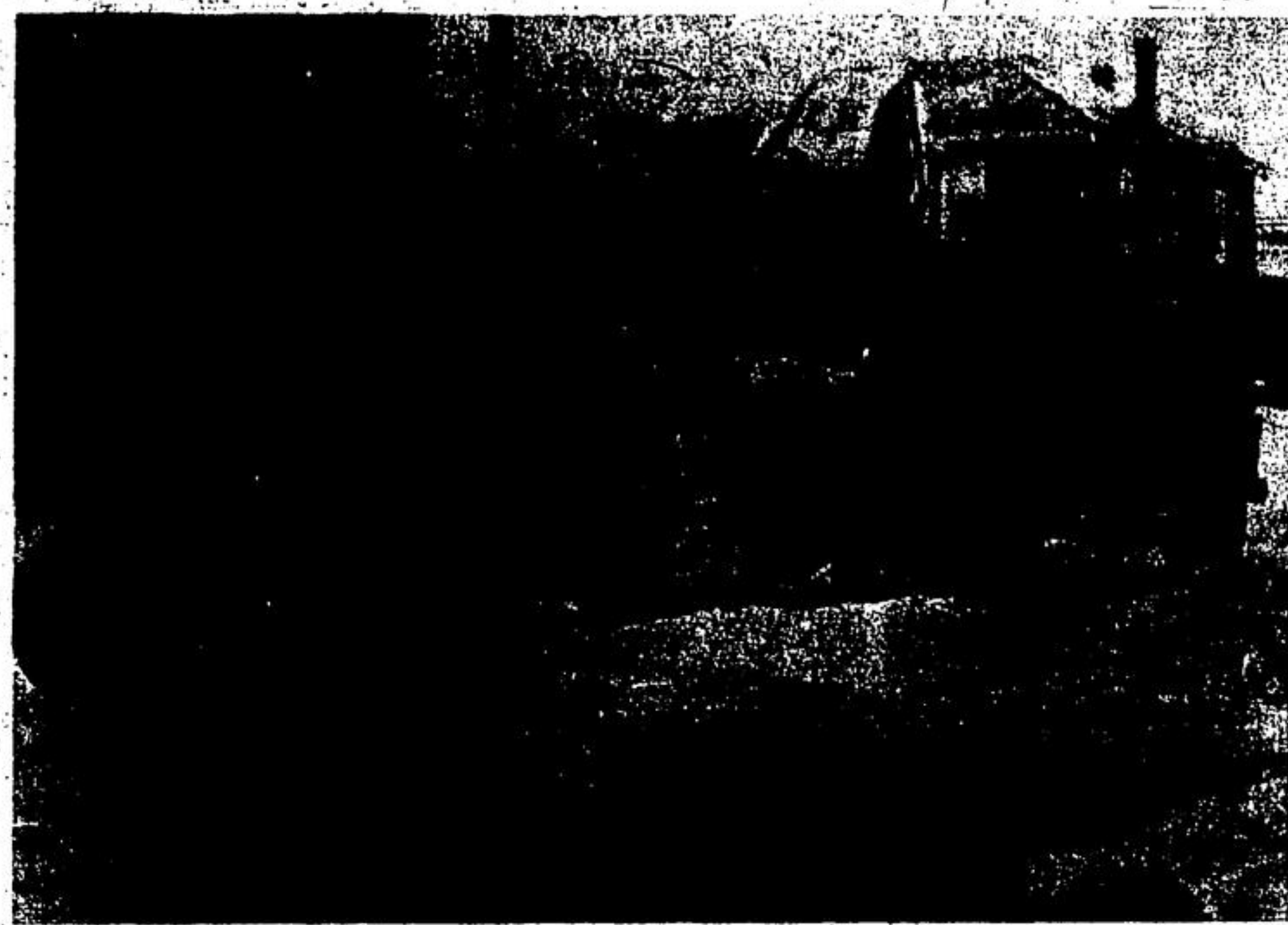

**Elect William D. Gillies Halton East NDP candidate**

William D. Gillies will be the hope of the New Democratic Party in the provincial riding of Halton East in the next election.

A crowd of over 50 enthusiastically endorsed the 45-year-old candidate at its nomination meeting in the Club Galaxy, Oakville, last night (Tuesday). Mr. Gillies, a candidate in the last provincial election in September 1963, was opposed in his bid for the nomination.

A "we can win" theme pervaded the meeting as the NDP supporters looked optimistically toward the expected election. Provincial NDP leader Donald McDonald had told the executives of ridings to prepare for an "early election" and the meeting seemed quite

**Nomination dates set**

The finalization of dates for two nomination conventions and the announcement of a third candidate for the Progressive Conservative nomination in the new provincial riding of Halton East kept the local election pot simmering this week.

The latest candidates for the P.C. nomination is 37-year-old James W. Snow of Hornby. He joins Oakville Parks Board Administrator Bill Bateman and University student William B. Sargent in the race for the Halton East P.C. nomination.  
Mr. Snow, president of Snow Construction Company Ltd. of Oakville, is married and the father of four children. For many years he has been active in Lions Club work and now holds the position of Deputy District Governor.

In announcing his candidacy, Mr. Snow noted, "I've been a Conservative and I've been thinking about running, seriously, for the past week or so." The new candidate for the P.C. nomination received his elementary and high school education in Milton and has been a resident of the Milton district all his life.  
He believes "the housing problem is probably the most serious thing the next provincial government will have to deal with."  
The local P.C. organization announced this week that the nomination convention would be held in Milton District High School on March 17.  
Halton East Liberals have set February 15 as the date of their nomination convention. Newly elected provincial Liberal leader Robert Nixon will be the guest speaker. Two candidates, Oakville councillor Murray Haesler and Oakville teacher Robin Skuce have said they will seek the nomination.

**Committee is named to plan centennial Nassagaweya Twp.**

A 14-member Centennial Committee with representatives from many of the groups in the Township was appointed on Monday evening at a special meeting in the Nassagaweya Township Administration Building.  
Representatives of Township organizations turned out for the meeting called by Reeve William Coulter and appointed the committee. It will be the duty of the committee to make arrangements for the marking of centennial year in the Township. Some suggestions include a possible pageant and special parades with floats. The last week in June has been tentatively set as the date for most of the celebration.

**Take first step on Ontario Museum**

The first formal step towards having a provincial agricultural museum located on the Archie Service farm at Milton Heights was taken in the Ontario Legislature Friday.

Ontario's Minister of Agriculture and Food, William Stewart, introduced the bill in the legislature on Friday. The bill provides for the appointment of a curator and staff and an advisory board of between five and 11 members. It also provides for the use of the museum facilities and its financing by public money.

The Archie Service farm was purchased in 1966 by the Halton Region Conservation Authority. The land is adjacent to the popular Kelso Conservation Area.
