

The first formal step towards having a provincial agricultural museum located on the Archie Service farm at Milton Heights was taken in the Ontario Legislature Friday.

Ontario's Minister of Agriculture and Food, William Stewart, introduced the bill in the legislature on Friday. The bill provides for the appointment of a curator and staff and an advisory board of between five and 11 members. It also provides for the use of the museum facilities and its financing

by public money. The Archie Service farm was purchased in 1966 by the Halton Region Conservation Authority. The land is adjacent to the popular Kelso Conservation Area.


