When the World Day of Prayer is held on Friday, Feb. 10, it is expected that Canadian women in more than 3.500 communities from Newfoundland to the Yukon will participate.

They will use a service prepared by the late Queen Salote of Tonga, a dedicated Christian, who for many years led her own people in this annual observance. As has been customary in recent years, the first of the day's gatherings will be held at dawn in the South Pacific's Tonga Islands, moving westward with the advancing sun until prayers for peace and understanding have literally circled the globe.

Queen Salote chose as her theme: "And of His Kingdomthere shall be no end". Though some translations and adaptations are necessary to suit local situations, the theme is

the same around the world. In Canada there are services for girls and children in addition to the ones for adults. English and French are the principal languages used in this country though Chinese and Japanese translations are made available as well as the braille copy from the Canadian National Institute for the

Though the Day of Prayer began in the United States as early as 1887 and in Canada in 1895, its spread around the world has been something of a modern miracle. It just seems to have "caught on" like similar movements in a number of countries.

While intercession is the central idea of the World Day of Prayer, offerings are also substantial. In Canada gifts amounted to more than \$75,000 in 1966. This money was used for the publication and distribution of Christian literature, re-

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
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
