## Works superintendent threatens resignation

Negotiations between the town work staff and No. 2 committee of council over a new wage schedule erupted into a full scale difference of opinion at last night's council meeting, when the mayor read a letter from work superintendent AH Doby threatening to resign if council went along with the committee's opinions as he understood them.

The letter stated the committee did not feel Mr. Doby was doing his job properly and felt there was a misuse of credit cards for trucks and misuse of maintenance on trucks and equipment.

Mr. Doby felt a \$300 wage increase offer was the only stipulation he had to improve. He felt as working superintendent, he had always co-operated and tried to treat all people equally.

He stated he was not aware he was being negligent and if the committee's opinions were those of council he would not continue in his employment with the town.

Councillor Bob Drinkwater said he was sorry the letter got to council without first being referred to No. 2 committee who were handling negotiations. He admitted they had received the wrong information on one or two occasions, but the point they were trying to get across was that they would prefer him to be a non-working superintendent.

He said there had been no personal misuse of credit cards, just a misuse. Negligence of equipment was brought on himself.

Mr. Drinkwater came to the committee and made the statement. The committee felt he was doing too much work. It was partly the fault of the clerk-administrator, I was not aware he was under direct orders from him.

The committee was not trying to be critical; they were just trying to put a policy across at 12 midnight which the superintendent had taken the wrong way.

## Y. M. C. A. still self supporting vigorous program in past year

Although Acton Y.M.C.A. has not shared in any campaigns or financial drives for many years it is still proudly self-supporting, treasurer Elmer Smith asserted at the annual general meeting of the Y. Board following the Y's Men's meeting last Thursday evening.

Fixed rentals, a vigorous and generous Y's Men's Club and Ladies' Auxiliary were chiefly responsible for the support of the Y.M.C.A. Donations with the exception of one from Orenda Engines of Milton, had proved disappointing by small.

Y Board chairman, Garnet "Pat" McKenzie, called the meeting to order, inviting Mr. Smith to present the financial report for the year ended on December 31, 1966.

In his analysis of the report Mr. Smith stated the balance on hand was somewhat less than on December 31, 1965

and explained this was due to an increased program during 1966.

The more vigorous program had greatly increased the membership during 1966 and the voluntary efforts of Y's Men and Board members had produced greater service and program for the boys and girls of this community than was actually realized.

While the Y.M.C.A. may buzz with activity every night, the Board realizes that there could be certain day-time activity. However the employment of a full time secretary would only serve to duplicate the services of the town's recreational director. The Y.M.C.A.'s aim was to work in closer harmony with the town and not in competition, thus expanding the existing programs.

For their part in the increased program activity, appreciation was expressed towards Carl Chadbourne and Peter Lawson of the University of Guelph and to Mrs. Art Cooper, Jo-Marie Marchant, Danny Arbie, Phil Dupuis and Rick Cos.

Nominating committee chairman Walter Dubois presented a list of Board members for 1967. They are: Miss Mary Beth Elliott, Pat McKenzie, Elmer Smith, Bill Wilson, Bill Neiles, Phil Elliott, John Van der Kooij, Ed Leatherland and John Last.

Owing to a car accident on icy roads, Phil Elliott was unable to be present to report on programming.

In presenting the building report, John van der Kooij stated that the front hall was redecorated in the early Spring but that certain problems arose with the heating unit as soon as winter started. Professional repair work overcame most of the trouble.

New leases were drawn up in connection with the Board's

lodge and the apartment. Plans for 1967 included the painting of the outside of the building in the early spring, shelved during 1966 because the budget just wouldn't stand it. Serious consideration will have to be given to the heating unit. Some necessary re-plumbing encompassing the front hall and the old library area would give the town office more floor space.

The 1966 Board was accorded a vote of thanks for their achievements.
