Convention approves township plea for gravel, stone levy

A Nassagaweya-sponsored resolution calling for a levy per ton on all gravel and stone extracted in the province, won unanimous endorsement from the Ontario Association of Rural Municipalities during its Toronto convention recently.

The resolution called for the levy to establish a fund for "the rehabilitation of defaced areas."

Councillor Anne MacArthur moved the resolution at the Toronto assembly, suggesting it was time for provincial action to reduce the defacing of areas like the Niagara Escarpment.

The session adopting the resolution in Toronto was attended by an estimated 500 representatives of rural municipalities.

The resolution noted quarries and gravel supply companies are presently required to comply only with local by-laws controlling the perimeter of operations and assessment from the areas is mainly on the land with minimal levies on excavated areas.

Five on staff
