

It certainly isn't easy to get to three no trump on these cards. In fact, the usual contract would be one no trump. One pair at the club actually passed out these hands. The trick is to make nine tricks at

Warned by South's heart bid,

West will lead a club. Now declarer must make his plan. Often it is advisable to hold up once in the opponent's suit, but this is not one of those times. Declarer must win the first club in his hand with the king. The club ace must be preserved as an entry. Now declarer must lead a spade and keep leading them until East takes his ace. East will return a club or a heart after winning the

spade ace. If he returns a heart, West can take three tricks, but no more. Since he will not wish to break open the diamond suit, West will probably lead another club. But no matter.

Declarer has a small club and can enter dummy to cash any good spade tricks. This will give declarer five -tricks for sure - three spades and two clubs. To make three no trump, declarer must come home with four diamond tricks.

The lead is dummy and Bast will not make a mistake. Which diamond must be led in order to ensure four diamond tricks? Did you lead the queen —if you did, you were wrong. If you led low, you were wrong. The correct lead is the

nine of diamonds. If East covers, there is no problem, so we must assume that East won't play the king.

The reverse will not work. If the queen is led originally, East again will duck. If South oplays the three, the next dismond lead would be won in South's hand and the finesse can only be taken twice.

If declarer throws the jack. or ten under the queen, then East can cover the nine when. it is led and ensure the defense of one diamond trick.

This is a most interesting combination of cards. I suggest you lay out the diamonds in cards and try the various combinations. Careful planning is required to get the four diamond tricks.
