Council "prepared to pass" zoning by-law, official plan for Nassagaweya Township

Ratepayers of the Township will have one last chance to comment on the new zoning by-law and official plan before Nassagaweya Council takes final action.

At a joint meeting of the Township Planning Board and council on Tuesday evening of last week, it was resolved that council would be prepared to pass the necessary by-laws to implement an official plan and zoning by-law at its meeting on April 3.

The two documents, in the works for more than a year and one half, have been compiled through the joint efforts of Planning Board and Project Planning Associates.

A resolution passed at the Tuesday night meeting instructed the firm to complete "the official plan and zoning by-law as amended, and forward it to the secretary of the Planning Board as soon as possible."
