

Queen's Park Report

The great debate about trading stamps flared anew last week when the Attorney-General informed the Provincial Assembly that the Government is considering legislation to ban the distribution of such stamps by food stores in Ontario.

Members that I have polled in the House seem evenly divided on this sub-

The main argument against these stamps is that they are a promotional gimmick which adds to the cost of food and groceries; that if a consumer does not use them, he or she is paying extra for something unnecessarily, and further, it encourages the housewife to concentrate on a camera or can-opener instead of price and quality. Other arguments are that such promotion does not increase the consumption of any particular brand or product, doesn't help the farmer and primary producer, and finally, that many such gimmicks are operated illegally.

Those who are opposed to legislation banning trading stamps or are indifferent about it feel that a consumer should have the right to make a choice, that not all stores give stamps, and more important, food at the stores, that don't handle them is not any cheaper than food at the stores that do!

The people that are against a ban claim, probably quite correctly, that if will het be passed on to the consumer in lower food prices. All food chains budget a certain amount of money for advertising and promotion, and if not by handing out trading stamps, then in some other media or method allowable under the law.

The distribution and sale of food products is a very competitive business, and each grocery chain does as much as possible to successfully compete.

Last fall at a provincially-sponsored agricultural conference at Vineland, Ontario, a group known as the Canadian Association of Consumers supported by such other varied groups as the Retail Merchants Association, the Ontario Federation of Labor, the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario and the Ontario Food Council all urged a ban on trading stamps in the province. This is probably why the Attorney General is considering such legislation.

There was a very interesting editorial in last Friday's Hamilton Spectator on this subject. The Spectator, apparently as a result of its quick survey is against proposed legislation to ban the


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
